

DEADLOCK IN MILL STRIKE DIMS HOPES

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that "there is no time in this emergency for employers and employees to engage in interminable bickering."

The statement, given out by Chairman Truman (D-Mo.), went on to say:

"There is still less time to wait until loss of profits in the case of the employers or loss of wages in the case of employees can determine the result of a strike. Speaking plainly, the public has a right to expect and even to demand that its paramount interest will be respected."

Truman said the conference had asked for data on a west coast shipyard walkout, which, he said, involved \$295,000,000 of shipping. Information also has been requested, he asserted, on the "strike affecting the Chrysler tank arsenal" in Detroit. He did not identify the latter strike further.

Over the protests of the navy department, the maritime commission, and labor leaders themselves, some 1700 AFL and CIO machinists struck at west coast shipyards, while on the east coast, vessels were tied up as crews demanded wage increases.

Eleven San Francisco bay shipyards and drydocks, heavy with defense orders, were affected by walkout. Employers said \$500,000,000 in contracts suffered. The workers demand \$1.15 an hour and retention of double time for overtime. The men were offered \$1.12 and time and a half.

WORKER TESTIFIES IN NLRB HEARING

Testimony of Folk Haddock, a board witness, occupied the better part of a morning session of the national labor relations board hearing on the Hoesley Logging company Saturday.

The hearing, which started Thursday, is on an NLRB complaint charging the logging firm with interference in union activities, maintaining a company-dominated union, and discharging six employees for outside union activity.

Haddock testified in regard to his being discharged over a dispute concerning a wage scale.

Friday afternoon testimony of A. A. Richardson, one of the Hoesley employees assertedly discharged for CIO organizational work at a time the Industrial Employees union represented firm workers, was continued from a long morning session.

John B. Ebinger, attorney for the Hoesley company, carried on cross-examination during most of Richardson's afternoon appearance.

Both sides expect the hearing to continue through most of next week.

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—The tremendous spurt in Britain's aerial warfare this week was described by some military authorities today as evidence that United States assistance is enabling the British to use both defensive and offensive planes in much greater numbers than heretofore.

These authorities cited three recent developments involving plane supplies from this country as contributing to the RAF's reported success in taking heavy toll of Nazi attack bombers and spreading destruction over Hamburg, Bremen and other reich cities.

They pointed first to the huge and steady increase in American military plane production this spring. In March the output of both commercial and military craft totaled 1216. Last month the output of military planes alone was 1427, about equally divided between training and combat craft with probably more than half of the latter destined for Britain.

British Prime Minister Churchill marked the anniversary by sending messages of thanks to the prime ministers of both governments.

Bank Robber Suspect Notted by Prints

LITTLETON, Colo., May 10 (AP)—Joseph Burke, 40, identified by fingerprints as a man sought in the \$12,000 holdup of the Littleton National bank in 1928, was held in jail today while Ogden, Utah, authorities check Burke's alibi claim that he worked in an Ogden store at the time of the robbery.

Burke was returned to Littleton yesterday from Hood River, Ore., by Sheriff E. E. Monzingo. Arrested at Hood River on a traffic charge, Burke elected to serve a jail sentence rather than pay a fine.

Sheriff Monzingo said Burke was fingerprinted on his admission to jail. The sheriff said the prints tallied with those of a man whose picture was identified by the bank cashier as a likeness of the bank robber.
