

BOMB CONVICT DROPS DEAD ON BUTTE STREET

BUTTE, Mont., May 10 (UP)—John J. McNamara of Cincinnati, O., who served 10 years in San Quentin prison for the dynamiting of the Llewellyn iron works in Los Angeles in 1910, dropped dead of heart disease at a street intersection here Wednesday.

McNamara was the brother of James B. McNamara, who died in San Quentin March 8 while serving a life sentence for the bombing of the Los Angeles Times building October 1, 1910. Both brothers were involved in the Times bombing, in which 20 persons were killed.

McNamara was returning to Cincinnati after a business trip to San Francisco to conclude the affairs of his brother. He stopped here to visit friends and last night spoke before the Silver Bow trades council.

The McNamara brothers, Ohio-born, were central figures in the Los Angeles dynamiting of 1910-11 which sent 41 union leaders to prison.

Jim and John McNamara were connected with International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers during a period when the union was blasting buildings constructed by non-union labor.

At 1:07 a. m., October 1, 1910, the Los Angeles Times home edition was just going to press when the building was rocked by a dynamite explosion. Twenty printers, pressmen and editorial workers were killed in the shambles and fire which followed the bursting of a gas main and another 20 were injured.

William J. Burns, famous detective, took the case two days later and rewards totaling \$300,000 were offered for capture of the bombers.

The McNamara brothers were arrested and pleaded not guilty. Attorney Clarence Darrow came to defend them.

Labor raised a defense fund of \$250,000.

On December 1, 1911, James McNamara confessed and pleaded guilty to the slaying of Charles J. Haggerty, Times machinist. John McNamara pleaded guilty to the dynamiting of the Llewellyn iron works on Christmas day, 1910.

James McNamara went to San Quentin for the rest of his life, which ended two months ago after a long illness. He served part of his sentence in Folsom prison.

John McNamara was given a 15-year sentence, of which he served only 10 years before he was paroled May 10, 1921.

Matthew A. Schmidt and Dave Caplan, accused of buying the dynamite that blasted the Times building, were also given long terms. Schmidt gained his release in August, 1939, and is now in Chicago. Caplan served a 12-year term for manslaughter and was released July 10, 1923.

SEATTLE, May 10 (P)—Completing an exhaustive study of the past three years, the U. S. agricultural statistics division of the Thursday estimated livestock and their products last year brought Washington farmers \$61,000,000 last year. The average for the two previous years was \$58,000,000, or \$725 for each of the 81,686 Washington farms listed in the 1940 census.

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PELICAN BEING REVAMPED AT \$10,000 COST

Largest permit of the month thus far was issued to Mrs. Rose M. Poole for a \$10,000 remodeling job on the Pelican theatre on South Eighth street. Work was under way this week and drastic changes will be made not only on the interior of the theatre, but on the exterior as well.

Interesting feature of the remodeling contract is to be the installation of two mammoth mirrors in the foyer landing of the mezzanine, one mirror to be nine feet square, the other nine by 12 feet. All balustrades and railings are to be removed and replaced by metal. Rest rooms on both the mezzanine and foyer will be tiled and redecorated.

Another major step approved in the remodeling of the theatre is the installation of the new type push-back seats which will be installed throughout the loge section, balcony, and also in the orchestra section on the main floor.

Complete redecorating is planned by Mrs. Poole including the installation of new drapes and curtains for the large stage. A new marquee is included in plans now being carried out, and a feature will be the use of large modern type Wagner letters.

Youth Gets Life Sentence for Kidnap-Murder

NAPA, Calif., May 10 (UP)—John E. Wylie, 19, must spend the rest of his life in prison for one night of crime that included kidnapping, murder and robbery. Superior Judge Percy King sentenced Wylie to life on a first degree murder charge, and two terms of one to 25 years on each of two charges of kidnapping.

Young Wylie kidnapped Dale Martin and his sweetheart, Anne Simonsen, Vallejo, last Saturday night and killed Martin.

Wylie tried suicide after he was captured on a four-county manhunt.

Wylie took the sentences calmly but his mother, Mrs. Elsie Shepard, Richmond, cried "Oh, Judge," and burst into sobs. The state had not asked for the death penalty on grounds there was "no evidence of premeditation" for Wylie's sudden escape.

Seattle Gets Slum Clearing Enterprise

The Pacific northwest's first public housing project is now under construction at Seattle. It is Yesler terrace, a United States housing authority low-rent community.

Called by newspapers "Seattle's most interesting social experiment," Yesler terrace is located in what was once the city's most fashionable residential area. Tenants of the project will have the benefit of one of the nation's most magnificent views—they will have a sweeping view of Mt. Rainier, of the Olympics in the distance, and of the sound.

The big project will cost in the neighborhood of \$3,200,000 and will provide homes for 690 families.
