Navy Yard Cost Runs to Millions

More than 31 million dollars in wages will be paid to Puget Sound navy yard workers during the next 12 months if the present working force continues, it was learned today. Staff headquarters, thirteenth naval district, reports that the government payroll for the huge shipbuilding and repair plant is now totaling \$2,593,504 distributed among the yard's 13,119 employees.

It is reported that yard rolls are on the increase and the "no limit" order was recently announced, indicating that no ceiling has yet been placed on the number who may eventually bring defense orders to higher speeds.
