The Yakima Pippins have stamped themselves definitely as the men o' the month in the Western International league.

Sweeping three baseball games against Salem over the weekend, the Pips rode into a first place tie with Spokane, the defending champion. The victories ran Yakima's string to eight straight, but it took two runs in the ninth inning of last night's game to turn the trick.

Yakima won the night game 3-2 after a 9-3 victory in the afternoon and a 2-1 squeeze Saturday night. Salem was able to get a total of only 17 hits in the three games.

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Whirlaway Victor in Preakness

BALTIMORE, Md., May 12. way Saturday followed his smashing victory in the Kentucky derby with a triumph in the 51st running of the \$50,000-added Preakness stakes and became the seventh horse in history to sweep both three-year-old classics.

The under-sized chestnut colt, owned by Warren Wright of Chicago, scored by the margin of five and a half lengths over King Cole while Our Boots was third in the field of eight.

The time for the mile and 3-16 run was 1:58 4-5. Whirlaway started slower than any horse in the field and trailed by almost 10 lengths King Cole, Dispose and Ocean rounding the first turn while Blue set the pace. Then Whirlaway came on with another of his sensational finishes to take the lead swinging into the home stretch and win as he pleased.

King Cole, owned by Ogden Phipps of New York, was two more lengths to the good of Our Boots at the end while C. S. Howard's Porter's Cap trailed by another fourth.

Little more than even money in the mutuels, Whirlaway and his jockey—little Eddie Arcaro—returned their many backers in the crowd of 40,000 persons the sums of \$4.30, \$4.40, and \$3.30 across the board. King Cole paid \$16.30 and \$7.80 and Our Boots \$3.60 for show.

The winner earned a net purse of \$49,365 and boosted his lifetime winnings to \$194,691. Kansas, Dispose, Curious Coin and Ocean Blue trailed in order—all of them badly beaten off. Although his time was two seconds off the track record held by Pompoon, Whirlaway ran over footing that was merely good and was eased up slightly at the end.

While the Brooklyn Dodgers, two full games out in front in the National league, head west today, and the Cleveland Indians, pacing the American league by three, are bound for their first swing through the east, the New York Yankees finish up their first road trip in Boston.

This temporarily stationary position making them fit subjects for study, it develops that the Yanks, lo and behold, are in fourth place. This would seem a surprising level for a team which the experts thought would battle the Indians for pennant neck-and-neck.

They plumbled the season's low yesterday, when the Boston Red Sox dropped them out of second place with a 13-5 shellacking in which four Yankee hurlers were clubbed for 17 hits.

While the Yanks were being thumped yesterday, the Indians, aided by home runs by Ray Mack and Hal Trosky, won the opener of a double-header from the St. Louis Browns, 7-5, but then were nosed out in the nightcap, 6-5.

Another 10-inning battle saw the Washington Senators bow to the Philadelphia Athletics 10-8. Buddy Lewis hit a two-run triple and then brought in the tying marker for the Nats in the ninth, only to become the goat an inning later when his error let in the A's winning run.

In Chicago, 40-year-old Ted Lyons, with nine days' rest, pitched a seven-hitter to best the Detroit Tigers and Tommy Bridges, 2-1. The White Sox veteran fanned five and walked six.

The Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals kept their two-game distance at the head of the National league parade, Brooklyn by shaming the Phillies 6-5, and the Redbirds with a 7-4 conquest of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

A nice job of relief pitching, three-hit ball for eight innings by lanky southpaw Cliff Melton, gave the New York Giants an 8-3 decision over the Boston Braves. Billy Jurges' triple with the bases loaded featured the Giants' four-run second inning.

For the Chicago Cubs, the man of the day was Claude Passeau. The towering right-hander shackled the Cincinnati Reds except during one inning, the sixth, when they put together their only three hits, all singles, for their lone run. The Cubs meanwhile made a dozen safeties good for a 9-1 verdict.

Klamath Falls' Pelican trackmen qualified three men for the state track and field finals next weekend Saturday in Eugene in the district 3 meet at Medford Saturday but lost to the Tigermen, 88-36. Grants Pass was third with 32 and Lakeview fourth with 24.

Outstanding performance of the sun-blessed meet was that of Pelican Co-Captain Marion Reginato, who hurled the discus 132 feet 3 inches to better the old district mark by more than 12 feet.

Hurdler Chuck McCandless of the Klamaths placed second in each barrier event, thus qualifying for state competition. Slim Jim Bocchi took a second in the javelin to earn a place at Eugene.

Medford, paced by Racin' Ray Johnson and Andy LaMarr, scored nine first places and four seconds, to win its fifth straight district title and qualify 11 men. Johnson tossed off a 49.6 quarter to crack the record and LaMarr copped two hurdle firsts.

Myrtle Point scored 10 points. Ashland and Henley six each. Jacksonville four, Chiloquin three and Phoenix two.

Highlight of the day to Klamath Coach Paul Deller was the showing of little Glen Kennedy in the 440. The young Pelican, placing a close third behind Johnson and Medford's Orr, was clocked by Deller in 31.5, exceptional time with anyone else but Johnson in the field.
