OSC Beaten, 77-54, As Heat Slows Steers' Try

EUGENE, Ore., May 12 (UP)—Sweating heat slowed performances here Saturday as the University of Oregon's track team beat Oregon State 77-54.

Oregon's Les Steers topped individual scoring with 12 points, but could clear only 6.88 in his specialty, the high jump.

Although a new meet record, it was far under his usual leaps, he captured the javelin, with 187 feet, 10 1/2 inch toss, and scored third in the discus and shot put.

Oregon's other multiple winner was Footballer Jake Leicht, junior college transfer, who took the 100 and 220 dashes.

SEATTLE, May 12 (UP)—Washington State college scored a surprisingly decisive 73-58 triumph over its traditional rival, the University of Washington in a northern division, Pacific Coast conference dual track and field meet Saturday.

In a battle that had figured to go either way by only a few points, the Cougars came up with unexpected strength in track events.

Litha Pat Haley, brilliant sophomore prospect from Trail, B. C., paced the Washington State triumph with first places in the 100-yard dash and 220-yard low hurdles, and a second in the 220-yard dash for a total of 13 points.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., May 12 (UP)—Exactly as advertised, University of Southern California's formidable but perspiring track and field team Saturday soundly defeated Stanford university, 95 to 36 in their annual meet in the hottest weather of the year.

USC's well-balanced team won 12 of the first places, and PITCH Johnson's Stanford squad found real consolation in winning the other three. Only about 1500 fans braved a blazing sun and temperatures that approached 90 to watch the meet.

Ernie's smooth fielding actions and ability to get rid of the ball without loss of motion, made the tough chances look easy. He will play plenty of second base for the Pelicans this year.

Bishop, who is now 25, started baseball at Walla Walla high school, also playing American Legion ball. His team went to the state of Washington finals, losing to Seattle. While attending Washington State college, Ernie made the freshman team and played varsity baseball for three years under Coach Buck Bailey.

Signed By Missions
In addition to baseball, Bishop turned out for basketball, making the squad in 1936 and 1937 as forward under Coach Jack Friel.

After completing college in 1937, Ernie signed with the San Francisco Missions, who optioned him to Lewiston, Idaho, then of the Western International league. four days ago was a thorough debating chamber.

Standing beside a teetering wall, Greenwood observed rubble, charred wood and masonry piled 50 feet high where pillars once soared to the vaulted roof and where oaken panels and tall windows once had graced the galleries.

"This too will come within my province and I must think about its reconstruction," he sadly remarked.

Among the thousands of bombs which rained from the moon-lit skies Saturday night were those which unroofed Westminster Abbey, damaged the British museum and Big Ben, the giant clock, and storied Westminster hall.

Whole blocks of the sprawling capital were devoured by flames which the most strenuous efforts could not check.

The central tower of the abbey, known as the Lantern, was smashed in and wreckage fell on the spot where England's kings and queens are crowned, but the coronation chairs had been moved to safety in August, 1939.

Other relics, too, were being found safe today amid the wreckage.

Germans Occupy Isle Near Crete

BERLIN, May 12 (AP)—German troops have occupied Melos island, in the Cyclades group 75 miles north of Crete, authorized German sources announced today.

Melos is the 12th of Greece's Cyclades islands which Germany and Italy have announced occupied thus far.

The seizure of Melos, the Germans said, "completely surprised" 118 Englishmen and 200 Cretans who were found there and taken prisoners.

EMPLOYEE TESTIFIES IN NLRB HEARING
Testimony of Theodore Osborne, discharged employee of the Hoesley Logging company consumed the entire morning session of the current National Labor Relations board hearing in the city hall Monday.

The hearing is being held on charges that the Hoesley firm interfered in union activity, maintained a company sponsored union, and discriminated against employees for outside union work. The Industrial Employees union is currently bargaining agent for Hoesley workers. Complainant in the case is the NLRB.

Osborne testified to his experience with the logging company and elsewhere and recounted alleged conversations with Chet Masters, Hoesley timekeeper, and L. D. Hoesley, owner of the firm, in April, 1940 concerning the IEU.

The ex-employee, one of six discharged men named in the complaint, said the conversations indicated Hoesley and Masters wanted all employees to join the IEU and keep other unions out of the operation.

Osborne also verified testimony given earlier regarding a dispute over log scale and falling rules.

Representing the NLRB at the hearing is William Babcock while John B. Ebinger is the attorney for the Hoesley firm. Also represented at the hearing is the IEU by E. H. Card of Medford and J. J. Wolf of Portland.

Osborne was scheduled to continue his testimony Monday afternoon under cross-examination by Ebinger.

Chiang Says China Willing To Tackle Shacking of Japan
CHUNGKING, May 12 (AP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek declared in a speech released today that China, without the help of an expeditionary force or naval action, but with material and economic aid, was prepared to undertake single-handed the task of putting down Japan.

He added it was his conviction that "any country in the world matching itself against American democracy would meet with certain destruction."

He spoke at a farewell dinner given by Mrs. Chiang for United States Ambassador Nelson T. Johnson, who is leaving to become minister to Australia. Many leading figures in China attended.

aviation, was able, contrary to these instructions, to acquire an airplane again recently.

"On Saturday, May 10, at about 6 p. m., Party Member Hess started on a flight at Augsburg from which he has not returned to this day.

"A letter left behind unfortunately shows in its confusion the traces of mental disorder which led to fears that party fellow member Hess was a victim of hallucinations.

"The fuhrer immediately ordered the arrest of adjutants of Party Comrade Hess who alone knew about those flights and did not hinder them, and did not report them in spite of instructions known to them to have been given by the fuhrer.

"Under those circumstances the national socialist movement unfortunately must assume that the party fellow member has crashed in a plane and had an accident somewhere."
