GOVERNMENT ASKS MORE DRY BEANS

Dry edible beans are another crop just added to those for which increased production will be sought this year, according to announcement of Secretary of Agriculture Wickard. More beans are needed to meet defense food needs, as they are so concentrated that they may be more easily shipped to other countries.

As an incentive to farmers to increase their acreages this year, the department has arranged to support the market for small white, great northern, pea, and medium white beans until about May 1, 1942. The price aimed at will be approximately \$5 per hundred at the eastern seaboard, which means \$4 per hundred or more in producing areas.

Oregon produces a relatively small proportion of the national dry bean output, but some sections can probably increase their acreages to advantage, according to G. R. Hyslop, head of the plant industries division at Oregon State college.

NLRB HEARING AT BIG LAKES SLATED

Another national labor relations board hearing has been scheduled for Klamath Falls next week, it was announced Monday.

On an AFL petition the board will conduct a representation hearing Wednesday, May 21, to hear AFL claims of a majority at the Big Lakes Box company. According to Joe Boyd, AFL organizer, the hearing may result in a board-ordered election to determine a bargaining agent for Big Lakes workers.

Nicotinic Acid Not From Tobacco, Says Specialist

A hurry-up call to inform the public that nicotine acid has no connection with nicotine is being sent out by nutrition specialists following reports that some consumers have gained such an idea in connection with the nation-wide program to restore vitamins to white flour.

As one of the three parts of the vitamin B complex is known as nicotinic acid, many questions have been asked regarding its possible relationship to nicotine. There is no connection, says Dr. Margaret Fincke, of Oregon State college, secretary of the state nutrition committee for defense. Neither does it add any acid to flour in the ordinary sense of the term, nor to spike another rumor, is the enriched any more fattening than other sorts.

UO Medical School To Increase Quota

PORTLAND, Ore., May 13 (UP)—The University of Oregon medical school will admit ten more students than usual this year to help meet the pressing need for doctors, Dr. Richard B. Dillehunt, dean, announced here Monday.

Dr. Dillehunt said the school is increasing its enrollment at the request of the association of American medical colleges. The school's maximum enrollment under the present budget is 250 students.

COUNTY GROUPS EYE NUTRITION

County committees to help further the cause of nutrition as an aid to national defense as well as the general welfare will be organized soon throughout the state as a result of action taken by the recently organized state nutrition committee for defense. This committee, headed by Ava B. Milam, dean of the school of home economics at Oregon State college, is part of the nation-wide movement to work for better nutrition during the national emergency period.

A state subcommittee appointed to carry out the county organization work is made up of representatives of three organizations already active in this field; they are Mrs. Azalea Sager, state home demonstration leader, chairman; Mrs. Clara Thompson, state home economics leader for the farm security administration, and Mrs. Laura Wells, consultant in nutrition for the state board of health, Portland.

The committee will also undertake to expand the school lunch program throughout the state, which is now reaching only 19 per cent of Oregon's schools, according to the report of a subcommittee headed by Mrs. Mabel Mack, extension nutritionist. Only 12 per cent of the Oregon schools are making use of the surplus food products made available by the federal government.

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Shortage of Farm Labor Felt Over Oregon, Report

Increased shortages of farm laborers are being felt throughout the state, reports indicated Monday.

While more carloads of migrant farm workers poured through Klamath Falls from southern California farm security camps to north state strawberry patches, a call was sent out from Nyssa and Ontario, Ore., for beet workers and onion thinners.

The announcement said approximately six months work would be available. Prospective workers will be housed in tents in farm camps but must have their own bedding and cooking utensils. Washing and toilet facilities will be furnished.

Meanwhile a demand for strawberry pickers still existed.

MARKETING QUOTA VOTE SET MAY 31

A series of county meetings to explain the provisions of the national referendum on wheat quotas were scheduled throughout Oregon from May 12 to 17 by the state office of the AAA. County and community committees will take the information obtained from state officers at these meetings and will pass it on to wheat farmers in general at community meetings to be held between now and the referendum date, May 31.

Approval of wheat quotas proclaimed on May 10 by Secretary of Agriculture Wickard, in accordance with the 1938 law, is vital to the future welfare of Oregon commercial wheat growers, believes Will Steen, Umatilla county farmer and chairman of the state committee. Unless the marketing quota plan is approved by two-thirds of those voting, the government loan program will be discontinued. Under the quota plan any grower who has stayed within his wheat allotment under the AAA program can market his crop the same as usual with no restriction.
