**WALTON WAILING WALL**  
Isaac Walton leaguers in search of better fishing condition at Crater lake held a round table conference with leaders of the local national park Friday and for two hours were told what stood in the way.

In the course of the meeting, presided over by Park Superintendent E. P. Leavitt, the following things came out:  
1. "Due to very sudden changes in Crater lake weather and the fact that the lake can be changed from a calm water to whitecaps 18 to 20 inches high in the course of 30 minutes and during many storms the white-caps have risen to three and four foot swells, the lake is very hazardous for light boats."

2. "The body of water has been classified by the United States government as a sea, and all boats including launches and fishing boats must be constructed to pass inspection as sea going craft."

3. "Due to these sudden storms and changes of weather and the lack of beach or harbor, it is necessary to take up these boats and transport them across the lake to Wizard island for permanent mooring 'each and every night' to keep them from being battered to pieces during the night."

For these reasons, according to Leavitt, it is difficult to place a great number of boats on Crater lake to accommodate fishermen.

Leavitt, however, stated he appreciated the "Waltons" viewpoint and believed that, with handling through the proper channels, within the very near future there will be more boats and taxi service from the boat landing out to various fishing points.

Local fishermen for years have been after more and better facilities for Crater lake angling. To date there has been a ban against beginning the lake descent from the rim before seven a. m. and a rule that everyone must be back on top by dusk.

Both regulations hamper fishing at its best hours. Another issue governing the use of motors on the lake is currently being handled.

Here the prime contention point lies in a balance between park service ends and fishermen's wants. Both have much in their favor.

## N. Y. Comish Warns Jenkins To Defend Lightweight Title

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., May 13 (UP)—Chairman John J. Phelan of the New York Boxing commission Monday warned Lightweight Champion Lew Jenkins that he must sign for a title bout by July 1 or forfeit his claim to the championship. The ultimatum probably will result in a September bout between Jenkins and Sammy Angott to determine the world's undisputed lightweight champion.

Jenkins, training for a non-title fight Friday night at Madison Square Garden with Bob Montgomery, Philadelphia negro, is recognized as 135-pound king by the New York Boxing commission and its affiliated states. Angott is champion in National Boxing association territory.

Jenkins has been training here for more than two weeks grooming seriously for one of the toughest fights of his career with Montgomery, the Philadelphia negro, who almost knocked him out in their initial engagement last September.

Opening the exhibition will be two new torsos, one another cowboy. It will be Cowboy Jim "Dutch" Heffner from the environs of Texas, and Vic Hill, 210-pound Tacoman. Heffner will be outweighed about 20 pounds.

The two universities had anticipated acceptance into the conference as full members next year, with the "Big Four" teams placing them on their football programs under staggered schedules. The northern members play Idaho and Montana every season.

The ouster proposition was understood to have the tacit support of the northern conference members—Washington, Oregon, Washington State and Oregon State.

## Lefty Grove Wins 295th Ball Game

Veteran Nears Immortal Mark as Red Sox Trounce Yanks; Cards Take Pirates

Lefty Grove's speed ball doesn't burn across the plate the way it did in the great days when he was the star of Connie Mack's 1930-31 Philadelphia Athletics but he still is winning baseball games.

The Boston Red Sox haven't picked soft spots for the long, lean left-handed thrower from the Maryland hills but he does pitch only once a week and each game he wins brings him closer to enshrinement among the immortals of the game.

Only five pitchers in modern baseball won 300 games. They were Grover Cleveland Alexander, Cy Young, Eddie Plank, Walter Johnson and Christy Mathewson.

The mound generalship and vast knowledge of pitching knowledge gained in Grove's 18-year major league career—nine with the Athletics and seven with the Red Sox—helped him Monday as he won his 295th American league triumph, 8-4 over the New York Yankees.

In the National league, Lon Warneke, St. Louis' 31-year-old righthander, pitched his fourth straight victory for the Cardinals to give the second-place Red Birds their second straight victory, 6-2, over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Chicago Cubs spoiled Monte Pearson's National league debut by scoring nine runs in the first three innings to swamp the Cincinnati Reds, 12-1. The Cubs' early winning scoring was made by bunting four hits with nine walks and four errors.

No other clubs were scheduled. He was reached for 81 hits but his teammates drove Lefty Gomez off the mound with an attack that included Jimmy Foxx's second homer of the year and three doubles. The Sox capitalized on Gomez' failure to find the plate in the first inning.

## Cal-Husky Crew Date May Change

SEATTLE, May 13 (AP)—When California and Washington get together again to set the date for the 1942 Pacific coast regatta, they won't grieve Al Ubrickson any if they hold the race in May instead of April.

Such action might even arrest the fast-graying tendencies of "Admiral Stoneface's" once jet-black hair.

The University of Washington crew coach explains: "With the California race in April it really means two years in one for us if we're going to Poughkeepsie in June."

"We get the kids to a peak for the April race, then we've got to lay them off until it's time to start training all over again for the Hudson."

"With the coast race in May, we wouldn't have to take the mid-spring layoff."

Al believes the layoff is one reason a west coast crew will lose in April and win in June, as has happened often in the past to either Washington or California.

"The winner gets a superiority complex and can't recapture the right spirit for the New York race, while the loser, with increased determination, often reverses the tables."
