

# FLOWER SHOW SLATED HERE ON SATURDAY

Only a few days remain before the annual spring flower show sponsored by the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club, this year to be held Saturday afternoon and evening in the auditorium of Fremont school. Because so many persons have become interested since schedules were first distributed, Mrs. E. D. Lamb, show chairman, has requested the schedule to be reprinted. It is as follows:

**Horticultural specimens:**  
● Tulips, three: (a) Darwin and hybrids; (b) Cottage and hybrids; (c) Breeder; (d) Parrot; (e) Species.  
● Iris: One stalk, (a) Bearded, named and unnamed; (b) bearded.

● Lilies: One spray, twenty-seven inches, (a) Old fashioned single, old fashioned double; (b) French hybrids, single, double; (c) Persian.  
● Pansies, five blooms with foliage.  
● Violets, nine blooms with foliage.

● Columbine, three sprays, (a) long spurred; (b) short spurred.  
● Roses, one: (a) hybrid tea, single, double; (b) climber, (spray) single; (c) Floribunda (spray); (d) Polyantha, (spray); (e) Miniature, (stem); (f) species, (spray).

● Artistic arrangements over 18 inches in height.  
● Basket of spring flowers over 10 inches and under 18 inches.  
● A basket of spring flowers under 10 inches.

● Small bouquets suitable for end table.  
● A child's breakfast tray with flower arrangement.  
● Luncheon table set for four, card table size.  
● A Victorian flower arrangement.

● An arrangement of spring flowers in a pitcher, no limit as to size.  
● An arrangement in an old fashioned container.  
● Arrangement of spring flowers in a pillow vase.

● An arrangement of flowers in a low container to be placed against a wall.  
● Warm colors in copper, brass or bronze.  
● Cool colors in silver, pewter, platinum or like metals.

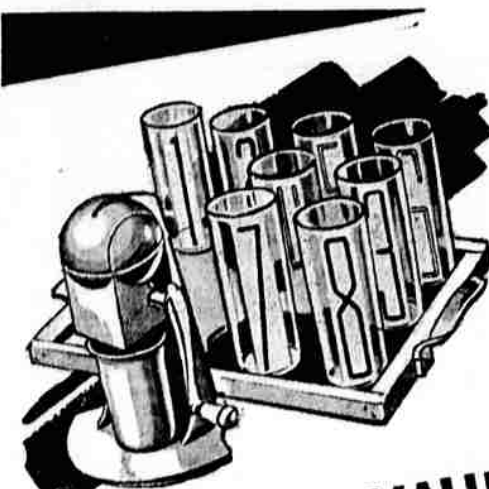
