

SUMMER PLAY PROGRAM SET FOR KLAMATH

Work has been in progress for several weeks, through the recreation office in regard to the summer recreational program. Sand boxes are being filled, equipment has been repaired, new equipment has been purchased, and the plans are for a very enjoyable summer for the boys and girls of Klamath Falls.

On June 16 the summer recreation program will start. This very interesting period of activities will last for two months, ending August 16.

Recreational centers will be held at Mills, Roosevelt, Conger and Pelican schools, Richmond field and Moore park. The Mills school center will be in charge of Verne Speirs who is principal of Riverside school; Roosevelt school will be in charge of Joe Peak, assistant football coach at Klamath Union high school. All activities at Pelican school will be under the supervision of Gerald Clemens, who is boys' physical education teacher at Mills. The shop class carried on at Roosevelt and Mills schools will be under the able leadership of Leroy Erdman, head of the manual arts classes of the city schools for several years. Ervin Bingman will handle activities at Moore park. The girls activities will be handled by Dorothy Marshall, physical education teacher at Mills.

At each center assistants will be furnished the supervisors by the government. These assistants are also well qualified for their work due to the fact that they have been working for several years on the summer program.

This summer, if there is enough demand, there will also be instruction in dramatics, radio and puppetry. This will be made possible by Roberta Blomquist of the high school faculty. Mrs. Blomquist has agreed to donate her services providing there is enough interest, towards the development of individuals who are interested in dramatics, radio and puppetry. There will also be much valuable help furnished Mrs. Blomquist by the N.Y.A. If you are interested in any one of the three activities mentioned above, please phone Mrs. Blomquist or the recreation office.

At Moore park, through the courtesy of the park board and E. E. Spencer, superintendent of the park, a special croquet lawn has been made possible. In the past the only available place for croquet has been on dirt fields. This new croquet lawn will permit four sets to be in use at the same time.

Much hard work and study is made each year to make the summer enjoyable for the boys and girls of Klamath Falls. The supervisors, the director of recreation and the recreation committee hope that the parents and adults of Klamath Falls show their appreciation by encouraging the boys and girls to attend the summer recreational centers.
