Young America Produces Ships



A seven-foot wingspread doesn't compare with the new 80-ton Douglas B-19 but no full fledged pilot of the world's biggest bomber gets any more thrill than does Stephen Kessler, 14, 406 Lincoln street, when he sees his newest gas model plane take the air in a 20-second flight. It takes a quarter of a teaspoon of gas, same mixture as used for outboard motors, to operate this plane in its flight, limited to 20 seconds to prevent loss of the engine. Kessler, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Kessler, is a member of the Klamath Falls Gas Model Airplane club, this past month affiliated with the national organization, American Models association, branch of the older American Aeronautical association. Thirty-five members make up the local club headed by Dr. L. M. Burke. Engines in the model planes operate 6000 to 8000 revolutions per second, Burke stated. Plans are now being made for a contest to be held at Dry lake on the Weed highway, with model airplane builders from Seattle, Portland and San Francisco competing with the local club.

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PROMOTION OF TRAVEL OVER HIGHWAY EYED

A group of Bend chamber of commerce men attended the directors meeting of the Klamath chamber Wednesday noon to discuss methods of promoting travel on route No. 97, The Dalles-California highway.

Don Peoples, secretary of the Bend chamber, suggested the possibility of a cooperative program to include various communities along the route in California, Oregon and Washington.
