

MOVE MADE TO SAVE AIRLINE CHANCES HERE

Local civic workers and aviation enthusiasts moved quickly to save the United Airlines application for Klamath service from unfavorable disposition by the civil aeronautics board.

The board's examiners this week recommended the application be rejected, reportedly because it would involve new mileage and equipment at a time when civil aviation must yield to military aviation needs. The board will review the examiners' recommendations before final action.

The chamber of commerce rushed an airmail letter to the CAB asking for consideration of Klamath's situation and pointing out that the United could establish service here without additional mileage if it were permitted to operate one of its regular schedules into Klamath Falls.

Telegrams were also to be sent to congressional delegates in Washington asking them to intercede in Klamath's behalf. The aviation committee of the chamber of commerce was active in the effort to change the complexion of the local aviation outlook.

The local view of the situation is that the CAB examiners apparently considered the United would establish a shuttle service into Klamath, which would require additional mileage. Placing this city on regular schedule would not have that effect.

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Germany. I had approved the idea of such a meeting.

Baldock also announced while here that further work is to be contracted for in the early summer on the Dalles-California north, between Klamath Falls and Algoma.

The present grading contract there leaves the old highway at Terminal city and extends to the middle of the Graham (Shady Pine) marsh. The next grading contract will carry to the foot of the Algoma hill, where connection again will be made with the present highway. The 1941 contracts will grade and pave to the foot of the Algoma grade.

The engineer said further that an investigation is to be made of the cost of improving the state highway west of town from South Riverside to Greensprings-Weed junction. H. P. Bosworth, director of the chamber of commerce in charge of roads and highways, and Earl C. Reynolds, secretary, emphasized in a discussion with Baldock that this road carries extremely heavy traffic, particularly to and from Kesterson, Weyerhaeuser and Kalpine mills.

Baldock stated that "some" work is to be done soon on the old Midland road, this having been authorized by the highway commission.

Turning to the Willamette highway, Baldock said: "Travelers may have noticed roughness developing on this new highway. On a long section of this road, only half the surfacing was installed and a thin coat of oil added in order to get the road open two years ahead of the time that would otherwise have been possible.

"As rapidly as funds are available, we will finish the foundation and place heavy oil surfacing on the Willamette highway. "The forest service is contracting for heavy foundation and oil surfacing of six miles along Odell lake."

Baldock said that re-location surveys on the west end of the Willamette highway have been made. The engineer was here only briefly on his way north from a trip to Shasta dam near Redding. He went on to Eugene Thursday morning.

MARINE RECRUITING SERGEANT ARRIVES

Sergeant W. Driggers, US marine corps, formerly on recruiting duty at LaGrande, Ore., has been transferred to Klamath Falls to take charge of the local office, first marine recruiting station here since 1928.

Sergeant Driggers enlisted at Florence, S. C., and has 10 years service in the US marine corps. Nine years of this time was spent on the USS Louisville, a cruiser. During that period the officer visited 13 different countries in the performance of his duties. The promotions and travel is typical of the average enlisting in the corps, Sergeant Driggers stated.

Many unusual opportunities are offered to young enlisted men, the officer remarked. Seventeen vocational schools are conducted and the Marine Corps institute covers 170 courses which is comparable to one year advanced college with credits at no cost to the enlisted men. Offices here are located in the Stewart-Drew building, Room 201. Hours are from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. weekdays, 9 a. m. to 1 p. m. on Saturdays.

Involuntary Jump

The navy disclosed Osipoff's leap from the transport, which was engaged in routine parachute jumping, was involuntary. A cargo parachute released from the plane pulled him out, and his parachute became entangled in the static line cable near the aft of the transport.

Several marines in the transport sought to pull him back, but said that the pressure was too great to accomplish a rescue in that manner.

Crash boats were stationed in the bay by the navy to rescue Osipoff should he fall. Then the two test pilots took off in the scout plane after the transport had circled twice over North Island and headed out to sea west of Point Loma.

After considerable maneuvering the smaller ship was piloted directly underneath the transport. The propeller of the small craft cut the shroud cords of the parachute while McCants held Osipoff and pulled him head first into the plane.

With Osipoff's legs dangling over the top of the fuselage of the scout plane Lowrey brought the craft to ground on North Island. Osipoff had lost consciousness from his position in the seat, but was quickly revived at the naval air station, where an examination indicated an arm fracture was the only serious injury he received.
