Washington Viewpoint

It was the writer's privilege this week to hear Joyce O'Hara, legislative representative at Washington for the United States chamber of commerce, in an interpretative discussion of current national and international events. He spoke at Spokane at the western division meeting of the U. S. chamber. Herewith is a brief synopsis of some of the interesting statements made by Mr. O'Hara, a former newspaperman:

The public wants the truth about the war situation. It wants the truth about the state of the national defense program. It is confused by references to materials "on order" rather than "on hand."

In Washington there is realization of the need for a national understanding of what we are trying to do in the international situation. What is needed is a national goal—a theme to rally around. There is a disturbing feeling that the United States is stirring itself into intense activity but still there is no general agreement as to what the ultimate purpose is.

A reassuring factor in the defense situation is the inclination of the president and the inner circle to consult closely with Admiral Stark, chief of navy operations, and General Marshall, chief of staff. These men are of the highest calibre in ability and good sense. Their advice is being invited and used in this crucial hour.

Congress desires to be fair in spreading the tax burden. The ideal tax is proposed as one that will not make the rich richer or the poor poorer. It is an unattainable ideal. No tax bill will ever be devised that does not make the poor poorer.

Most business men are opposed on principle to legislation that would outlaw strikes. They oppose it because it would set up a precedent not in harmony with the principle of free action in a democracy. A "cooling off" period in labor difficulties is an idea that has been gaining favor.

There is a growing sentiment in favor of re-examination of labor's privileges at some time in the not too distant future. There is a feeling that the time must come when we must deal fundamentally with the problems of employee-employer relations to create better feeling and bring an end to unnecessary disruption of activities that benefit both industry and labor.

A prominent man who spent several years in Germany while Hitler was preparing for the present struggle and witnessed the beginnings of Germany's military operations was asked what was the secret of Hitler's success. His answer: "Organization."

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, May 14—Hess' exploit with a parachute landed on the largest official desks here atop fresh intelligence of Hitler's expanding scheme for further conquests. Der fuhrer and his generals were reported to be concluding arrangements with Vichy to make a German base out of the African spot in which Mr. Roosevelt is most interested, Dakar. He is also supposed to be squeezing from the French a promise of passage through Syria, which would critically embarrass British defense of Suez.

The official authorities here were willing to believe this information because they have learned from the British definitely that Admiral Darlan permitted the nazis to reinforce their African armies by plane from Free France.

STALIN WORRIED

The same lofty quarters have been advised of a reason for Stalin's recent nervousness. He no doubt has heard the same reports received here that der fuhrer intends ultimately to push through Russia to the Urals (yes, the whole of European Russia).

Stalin has been running around trying to contrive pleasant gestures (such as premature recognition of the Iraq revolt) in hopes of pleasing the nazis.

For these reasons the London versions that Hess turned against Hitler because he hates Russia have been swallowed here with a whole tablespoon of salt, and, even so, are not palatable. The authorities here are inclined, however, to accept practically anything London wants to say about Hess as another method of aiding Britain. They had no straight worthwhile information, as the White House has publicly stated.

CONFLICTING NEWS

If the conflicting jargon in the world news leaves you slightly confused, you are still in the official boat with the biggest crowd of officials and citizens. Only if everything is clear to you, should you start worrying.

For instance, the administration sent Frank Bane, director of state and local cooperation in the defense setup, to the house public buildings committee to explain the new defense public works bill. Asked by a committeeman how local communities would benefit, Mr. Bane replied: "You will note that the bill states that this fund and this appropriation, if made, will be administered in accordance with rules and regulations promulgated by the president. The bill also states, however, that the fund is appropriated to provide facilities made necessary by the defense effort. So I would assume that someone will have to determine what facilities are necessary. . . . I certainly imagine that would be in charge of the federal works agency."

The committee thereupon assumed and imagined it also was in a fog and rewrote the bill.

CLASSIC

But the classic example of confusion naturally to be expected from the vast hurried defense enterprise is furnished by what has happened to the famous Sunnyside dirigible base in California. Navy Secretary Knox wrote congress April 22 opposing a bill to establish three new dirigible bases for the 48 new blimps to be constructed. Wrote Knox: "The matter has been discussed with the president who feels that further consideration for the establishment of lighter than air stations should be postponed for awhile."

Sixteen days later, on May 6, Navy Captain Rosendahl told congress the president had approved \$20,000,000 for the three bases, one near San Francisco to cost \$7,500,000. Members asked what happened to Sunnyside, the old dirigible base in that area. The evidence indicated Sunnyside had been transferred to the army months ago and could not be transferred back to the navy because the army had spent much money improving it. Instead \$3,000,000 would have to be spent to duplicate the Sunnyside hangar simply because the army instead of the navy now owns it.

Grange to Exemplify Fifth Degree

Klamath Pomona grange has announced that an exemplification of the fifth degree of the grange will take place at Altamont primary school Friday, May 16, at 8 p. m.

The newly organized YGA degree team will officiate with Charles Mollenhour, master of Merrill grange, taking over the office of Pomona master for the occasion. Three other masters of Klamath granges are members of the team which is composed of young grangers from six subordinate granges. It is urged by Master Mollenhour that all members of the team be on hand at 7:30 p. m. and that all candidates desiring to take the fifth degree be on hand before 8 o'clock.

This is the first time the fifth degree has been exemplified in Klamath county since the meeting of the state grange in Klamath Falls in 1938. For that reason it is expected a large class of candidates will take advantage of the opportunity to take the degree.

The YGA will furnish refreshments in the school cafeteria after the degree exemplification. Pomona Master R. H. Anderson will be the guest of honor and will transmit the password of the Pomona grange to candidates.

SENATE FAVORS ADDED POWERS FOR OPM HEAD

 WASHINGTON, May 15 (UP)

A bitter undercover battle over efforts to deprive the office of production management of its priorities powers ended in an OPM victory Wednesday. The senate military affairs committee rejected a plan that would have vested the army and navy with these powers.

The committee reported a bill giving President Roosevelt broad priorities powers and authorizing him to delegate the powers to the OPM or any agency he chooses. It first eliminated a house amendment which would have made the priorities administration an independent agency controlled by the army and navy munitions board.

Group Appears
 The committee acted after a group of high-ranking defense officials came to it in person and urged that the house restriction be deleted. They were led by OPM Director General William S. Knudsen, who took the occasion to deny categorically that he had threatened to resign if the amendment were left in the bill.

The fight may be renewed on the senate floor but it was noted that the committee rejected the amendment unanimously, lessening its chances for final adoption.

The amendment was sponsored by Rep. Eugene E. Cox, (D-Ga.), and was adopted on the house floor when Cox said its only purpose was to "freeze" Edward R. Stettinius, now the OPM's priorities director, into leadership of the new set-up. That the measure gave control to the army and navy was discovered only after it was adopted.
