Flag Salute Not Requirement for Peddling Pamphlets

MOSCOW, Idaho, May 15 (P) Federal Judge C. C. Cavanah ruled Wednesday the controversial Moscow pamphlet peddling ordinance, requiring permit seekers to salute the flag and take an oath of allegiance, is unconstitutional.

The judge held the ordinance, contrary to the constitutional provisions, "imposes censorship" on the dissemination of printed matter.

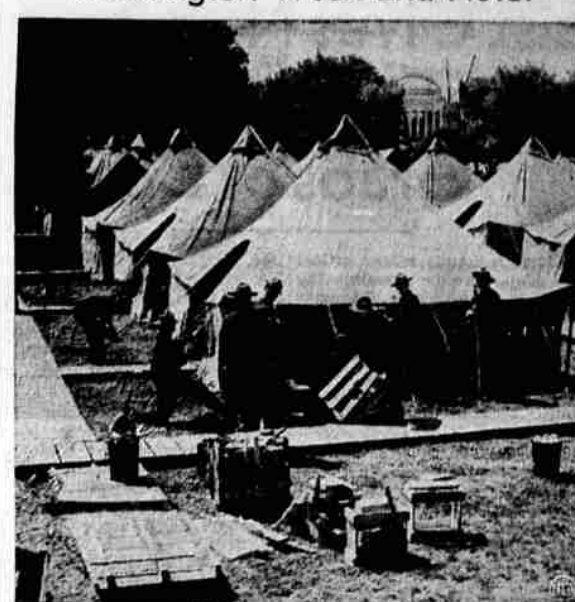
The case had been under advisement since Monday, when the city of Moscow petitioned for dismissal of a suit brought by two religious sects seeking to enjoin the city from enforcing the ordinance against them.
