Russia Protests Cargo Detention

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—Russia has lodged a formal protest with the United States, it was learned today, over the detention of a soviet cargo at San Francisco while in transit from South America.

Germany, such as Himmler, Ribbentrop, Ley and the general party bosses who act solely for themselves.

His reference was to Heinrich Himmler, head of all German police forces; Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop and Robert Ley, head of the Nazi labor front.

Henderson, who knew Hess well while he was in Germany, continued: "I regarded Hess as the adopted son of Hitler, a man to whom Hitler was devoted and was devoted to Hitler."

President Recalls U. S. Naval Policy Against Pirates

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—President Roosevelt injected today into a discussion of Germany's declaration that the Red sea will be a danger zone for foreign ships a pointed reminder that twice before in history the United States had used her warships to protect her commerce and obtain freedom of the sea.

He mentioned the action of the new American republic against the Barbary pirates in the Mediterranean a century ago and naval action as well against privateers in the Caribbean.

But when reporters inquired at a press conference whether he thought there were "any modern counterparts of the Barbary pirates," he told them merely to use their heads.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, May 16 (AP-USA) Fine territory wools in original bags were receiving a very moderate demand today at \$1.00-1.03, scoured basis, for short to good French combing lengths. Graded fine territory wools, comprising French and staple combing lengths together, were getting an occasional request at around \$1.05, scoured basis. Fine foreign wools were moving quite freely at \$1.00-1.04, scoured basis, including duty for Australian, and mostly 98 cents to \$1.04, scoured basis, including duty, for South American lines. A spotty demand was noted on combing three-eighths and quarter-blood bright fleece wools at 46-47 cents, mostly around 46 cents, in the grease, delivered to users.

HOSELEY HEARING DRAWS NEAR CLOSE

Attorneys for both the National Labor Relations board and the Hoseley Logging company expected to finish presentation of testimony Friday as the board hearing currently underway in the city hall entered the ninth tedious day.

Record of the hearing, on an NLRB complaint charging the logging firm with three unfair labor practices, will be sent to Washington, D. C., for a decision at board headquarters.

John B. Ebinger, stocky, painstaking company attorney, Friday morning questioned two witnesses regarding an obstruction placed before the cabin of Dennis Gathright allegedly by L. D. Hoseley, head of the Hoseley firm. E. H. Card and J. G. Wolf, Industrial Employees' union representatives, examined James J. Ware, present chairman of the IEU local at the respondent's operations.

Testimony of A. L. Book, a Sprague River merchant, and Clino Roper, constable at Sprague River, both firm witnesses, concerned an alleged Gathright threat to burn the obstruction.

Ware was scheduled for cross examination Friday afternoon by Jean, Lincolnshire William A. Babcock, young board attorney.

The hearing, conducted by NLRB Trial Examiner P. H. McNally, will have a sequel beginning Thursday, May 22, when the Crater Lake Box and Lumber company of Sprague River will appear as respondent before a board examiner on similar unfair labor practice charges.

Both board complaints were issued on charges by the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) that the companies were sponsoring and interfering with IEU locals.

Japanese Speculate On Hongkong Meet

SHANGHAI, May 16 (AP)—With high American, Chinese and British officials gathered in Hongkong or en route there, Chinese and Japanese newspapers focused attention today on the British crown colony as the scene of possibly significant conferences.

The Chinese press asserted officials of the three nations would confer on far eastern problems and forecast a swift increase in American aid for China following the arrival in Chungking of Clarence E. Gauss, new U. S. ambassador to China.

Chinese newspapers pictured Japan as greatly perturbed over the gathering in Hongkong of so many American diplomats and military officials.

RETAIL SELLING CONTINUES BRISK

NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—Buying in retail stores continued its brisk gait this week with sales averaging 15 to 18 per cent above last year for the country as a whole, Dun & Bradstreet reported today.

"The quickened selling pace of last month on the whole was well maintained," the merchandising agency said. "Home furnishings continued in strong demand, with 'lay-away' purchases of considerable significance in some stores."

"Sales of electrical appliances held at peak levels."

"A marked new gain in charge accounts and in credit sales was noted quite generally."

Wholesale purchasing continued to expand, with unusually heavy early demand for fall merchandise.

Pine Lumber Orders Continue Increase

PORTLAND, May 16 (AP)—Orders for western pine lumber continued to increase in the week ending May 10, the Western Pine association reported today, but shipments and production fell off slightly from the previous week.

Total orders in the week were 88,601,000 feet as compared with 85,483,000 the previous week and 77,433,000 for the corresponding week a year ago. Similar comparisons of shipments: \$1,492,000 feet, 83,067,000 feet and 72,593,000 feet.

French Surprised At American Deal Of German Deal

VICHY, France, May 16 (AP)—French government circles expressed the greatest surprise tonight that President Roosevelt's declaration on French relations with Germany "interpreted Marshal Petain's broadcast as putting French colonies at the disposition of Germany."

Following hard on these expressions, however, a French official statement acknowledged for the first time the British bombing of Syrian airports used by German planes en route to Iraq, but said this was not considered here to be aggression.

Frenchmen close to Marshal Petain's government said President Roosevelt had, as they put it, misunderstood the French necessity of entering into cooperation with Germany for the establishment of a new European political-economic order.
