

60 FORESTERS TO MEET NEXT WEEK IN K. F.

A special meeting of the Columbia River section of the Society of American Foresters on the subject of "Sustained Forest Production in the Klamath Basin" will be held here May 23 and 24 at which several of Oregon's outstanding foresters will appear, it was announced Friday.

An afternoon and evening session will be staged on Friday, May 23, with field trips to Weyerhaeuser Timber company and Indian land cuttings scheduled for the following day.

Over 60 forestry men are expected to attend, according to Thomas J. Orr Jr., of the Weyerhaeuser company, who is in charge of arrangements.

The Friday afternoon session, divided into three parts, will lead off with addresses by five men on the present situation regarding Klamath sustained yield. Scheduled to speak are R. W. Cowlin, of the Pacific Northwest Forestry experiment station in Portland; Herman Johnson from the same station; Harry Kallendar, Klamath county Indian reservation fire chief, and P. A. Briggles of the Portland forestry station.

George Gephart, forestry superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, will talk next on what local timber agencies are doing about sustained yield, which will comprise part two of the session.

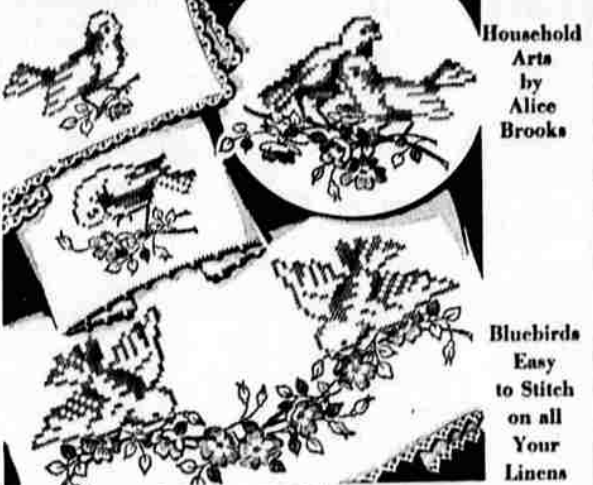
Third section of the meeting will be a floor discussion under Lyle Watts, director of region 6 of the U. S. forest service, on what more can be done about sustained yield in the basin.

A dinner meeting will be held at 6:30 during which a Klamath Falls speaker will give the local viewpoint on sustained forest production. All meetings will be held in the Willard hotel.

Insure Success for Your Bridge Party by Serving Novel Cakes

When your cakes are all triumphs, your bridge party is a success. Try these glistening white "ace" oblongs. With tea or coffee, they provide enough refreshment for the friendly spring bridge game.

Novelty Bridge Party Cakes
Two cups sifted cake flour, 2 teaspoons combination baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2/3 cup butter or other shortening, 2 cups sugar, 6 eggs, well beaten, 4 tablespoons milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift together three times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Bake in greased pan, 16 by 10 by 2 inches, in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 35 minutes, or until done. Cut into oblong shapes, 3 1/2 by 2 1/2 inches. Spread Ornamental Butter Frosting over cakes, paint in card suit designs with chocolate coating made by melting 2 squares unsweetened chocolate with 2 teaspoons butter.

Ornamental Butter Frosting
Two tablespoons butter, 2 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar, 1 egg white, unbeaten, 1 tablespoon cream, 1 teaspoon vanilla, dash of salt.
