

Director Talks On Child Welfare

Miss Jones Explains History, Purpose of Individual Child Needs to Club

The history and purpose of child welfare work, in which emphasis is placed upon the needs of the individual child, were outlined and explained by Marycarol Jones, director of child welfare in Klamath county, at the Thursday noon luncheon of the Soroptimist club at the Willard hotel when Miss Jones was introduced by Miss Catherine Gaylord, chairman.

"Events in the past generation or two," stated Miss Jones, "have led to an awareness of the needs of children and to a recognition of the fact that only through a variety of facilities can their individual needs be met."

"The establishment of juvenile courts in 1899, followed by the White House conference on child dependency in 1909, and by the development of mothers' pension, children's codes and the Federal Children's bureau two years later focused attention on the needs and welfare of children."

"All emphasized community responsibility in providing resources necessary to meet such needs, a responsibility which was slow in developing, especially in rural areas. It was the Children's bureau that called attention to the necessity for organizing state-wide and county-wide social welfare resources to give the same care and protection to the child in rural areas as in the city."

The speaker pointed out that in later years the existence of large numbers of children on relief indicated the need for better planning. The 7,400,000 children under sixteen on relief rolls in 1935, many of whom had never known a time when their fathers had a steady job and who faced a dark and uncertain future, indicated the need of a reevaluation of the entire public welfare program.

She said that it was realization of the plight of these children and of the fact that there are at all times several million children in need of special measures of protection, which stimulated congressional action.

"It was believed that provision for special kinds of care and individualized attention to restore lives already impaired and to save children from a future more tragic than their childhood was possible only through financial assistance from the federal government. These services were therefore provided through the Federal Social Security act, which represents the most ambitious and comprehensive attempt ever made by the American government to promote the economic security of the individual."

Miss Jones stated that the legislation providing mother's pensions for dependent children in 1911, was a revolt against the policy of separating children from their mothers on the ground of poverty, caring for them at greater cost in institutions and foster homes, and constituted public recognition that the contribution of the unskilled mothers in their own homes exceeded their earnings outside, and that it was in the public interest to conserve their child-caring functions.

The speaker explained aid to dependent children, crippled children's services, the youth program, adoptions and the foster home program. Oregon, she said, has extended care to 2846 crippled children, including fifty-six children in Klamath county, since November, 1938, and a clinic is held here quarterly by orthopedic doctors.

In speaking of investigations for adoption, Miss Jones aptly quoted Confucius: "The perfection of the vase lies not in the potter's clay but in the skill of the potter and the art of the glazer."

In regard to the foster home program, with its many angles that must be considered in relation to benefit of the child, she said that the problem in foster placement is no longer to make over the child to fit a certain good home, but rather to find the home to fit the needs of the child. And in answer to the question why there are more certain minimum requirements for the foster home than for the ordinary home, it is because an unprotected child needs greater protection, lacking the security and affection of family life in his own home.

The director explained that child welfare services are available to others as well as in families receiving public assistance, inasmuch as these services are concerned with social as well as economic problems.

"Klamath county is outstanding in its interest in child welfare," the director stated. "I need not list the service clubs and various resources available for all of you know them even better than I do, as you have helped in their development. I consider this an encouraging community in which to do my particular kind of work because of these
