

Cold Checks Two Pelican Ball Games

Sleet Pops Lights as Redding Leads Saturday Tilt; Haynes Injured

Cold weather, with a penetrating wind and some sleet thrown in, forced cancellation of two practice contests for the Klamath Falls Pelicans against Redding and Mt. Shasta of the Northern California league over the weekend.

An attempt to play the Redding game Saturday night was followed in the fourth inning when a driving sleet whipped against the hot lamps on the northeast side of the field and popped eight of them in rapid succession. The game was called with the Redding team leading, 5-0, but went as no contest since less than the required four and one-half innings had been played.

Manager Red Sanders expressed a firm conviction before the Saturday tussle got underway that the cold weather might be detrimental to his team's chances for victory in league play with possible sore arms resulting from throwing too hard under such unsatisfactory conditions. Such an unfortunate accident occurred in the third inning of the Redding tilt when Virg Haynes, twirling for the Pelicans, injured his arm and was relieved by Clyde Carlstrom who worked the fourth frame.

The scheduled Sunday game with Mt. Shasta Athletic club was called off early Sunday morning when it was discovered that the cold wind had not abated in the least. League di-

Medford Scores 36 Points To Walk Away With Team Crown; Mac-Hi Second

EUGENE, Ore., May 19 (P)—Medford's defending champions walked off with the Oregon high school track and field title here Saturday, far outdistancing their nearest rival.

The well-balanced Medford team scored 36 points. Wally Still of McLoughlin high, Mil-ton-Freewater, personally scored 11 points and enabled his team to win second place with 19. A surprising Corvallis squad was third with 13.

A heavy rainstorm turned the field into a swamp and made times slow. All champions, however, came through, with Ray Johnson, Medford, winning one of his team's four first places by pacing to victory in the quarter-mile for the third straight year.

Still defended his 100-yard dash title with a 10-second flat performance, won the 220-yard dash and ran on the second-place relay team. Stuart Schweizer of Adrian again won the low hurdles and Tom Hoover of Toledo the javelin event.

Team totals included: Chemawa 12; Bend 11; Molalla 11; LaGrande 10; Beaverton, Redmond and Alsea 8; Ontario and Grants Pass 6; Seaside, Klamath Falls, Adrian, Toledo, Milwaukie 5.

Only new record was in the discus event, in which a new lightweight platter was used. Marion Reginato, Klamath Falls, won first place with a 138-foot-5-inch toss and automatically became the record holder.

In Chicago yesterday Leo Durocher stuck Pete Reiser back into the Brooklyn lineup, in place of Jimmy Waddell, who'd been leading the club with a .370 average; benched Dixie Walker in favor of right-handed hitting Joe Vosmik, and—the Dodgers blew a 7-4 decision to the Cubs. With the St. Louis Cardinals meanwhile shading the Phillies, 6-5, that left Brooklyn only a game in front of the Redbirds.

Even Durocher's pet pitching magic, Fast-baller Whitlow Wyatt, lost its effect for once.

For the Cards Jimmy Brown was the big hitter with three singles and a double off the Phils' Lefty Lee Grissom. But it was Johnny Mize's single with the bases loaded in the ninth that scored the deciding run.

Back in third place the New York Giants ran their winning streak to four straight by beating the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-4, the Terrymen getting three in the seventh to win after the Bucs had made the most of six bases on balls to get all their runs in the first two frames.

Meanwhile Paul Derringer, getting his third win of the year, hauled the Cincinnati Reds

Second-place Seattle, attempting to cut down the Solon lead, won a doubleheader from Hollywood, 9 to 7, and 5 to 4, but it was still six and a half games out of first place.

Sustained effort won the first game. The Rainiers got a pair of hits in all but three innings and scored at least one run in all but three. Ed Cole registered his second victory of the series, which went to Seattle, four games to three.

The victories gave Seattle a better than .500 winning record on the road.

At Oakland, the hapless Aorns bounced out of the league cellar in winning the first game of a doubleheader with Portland, 5 to 1, but were sent right back into the basement when the Beavers copped the second, 6 to 1. Portland won the series, its second of the year, 5 to 2.

Ralph Buxton allowed no more than one of his five hits an inning in the first game. It was turnabout in the second game, Ad Liska limiting the Oaks to five safeties, two in the fourth and the rest in the sixth. The Beavers scored twice in the fourth inning, enough to win by, but added another four counters for good measure in the seventh.

Elderly Byron Speece tossed a three-hitter Saturday to give Portland a 3-0 shutout, only one Oak advancing as far as second base.

San Diego won yesterday's opener from Los Angeles, 4-3, on Wally Hebert's seven-hit pitching, but Julio Bonetti clinched the series for the Angels in the nightcap, 5-2. It was the righthander's fifth victory of the year against no defeats and installed him as the league's No. 1 hurler.

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Powerful Trojans Win Ninth West Coast Relays Crown

FRESNO, Calif., May 19 (UP)—The Trojans from the University of Southern California Saturday night won their ninth west coast relays championship with 804 points.

California was second with 534 points and Stanford third with 27.

The smashing win further established the national champion Trojans as the best track team in the nation. Robert Peoples paced the USC team with a javelin throw of 234 feet 3 1/2 inches, the best toss ever made by an American. He held the former mark at 234 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Records showed it was the longest javelin throw ever made

by an American. Matti Jarvinen of Finland holds the world's at 253 feet 4 1/2 inches and the United States record of 238 feet 7 inches, set Aug. 4, 1932.

Harold Davis, Salinas junior college sprinter, opened the meet with a brilliant 9.4 seconds performance in the 100 yard dash. Unofficially this tied the world's record, but a nine-mile wind nullified its recognition by the AAU.

Later Davis ran the 220-yard dash in the sensational time of 20.2 seconds—faster than the world's intercollegiate and American record of 20.3 held by Jesse Owens. But the favorable wind made this mark unofficial also.

Wind Hampers Performance At Grade School Tourney

A cold day with plenty of north wind spoiled what had promised to be an outstanding track and field meet when the outstanding athletes of the seven city elementary schools met for their annual event at Modoc field Saturday.

Despite the chilling weather four outstanding performances were turned in, though no records were broken. Junior Spetz, midjet star of a surprising Fairview team, turned in a 7 1-5 second 60 yard dash and came one-half inch short of the standing broad jump record for "C" class boys.

"Hank" Schortgen, Mills' one-man team, scored a broad jump of 18 feet 3 inches in the "A" event. Dannie Derrah, Fremont peewee entry, threw the baseball 152 feet 1 inch in the "C" event.

Fremont claimed the top team honors with a total of 57 points, Fairview was a strong second with 50 1/2, with Mills in third place on 27 1/2 points. Mills won the "A" meet with 21 points followed closely by Fairview with 17. Fremont piled up a huge score in the "B" meet with 29 points (a first in every event) with Fairview again second on ten counters. Fairview claimed tops in the "C" events with 23 1/2 points to 16 for Fremont.
