HIGH SCHOOLS SHOW INCREASE IN GRADUATES

Large increases in the number of high school graduates in Klamath county in the last seven years were shown in a compilation announced by school authorities here Tuesday.

A total of 373 seniors are graduating from the county's high schools this year, as compared with 226 in 1935. This is an increase of 65 per cent. The figures are inclusive of both Klamath Union high school and the nine high schools in the county school district.

The following table shows the increase in high school graduates in the seven-year period, with KUHS graduates numbers in one column, and the county district high schools grouped in the other:

It was also shown that in 1931, Klamath Union high school graduated 135 seniors, or 118 less than this year. In 1920, Klamath Union high school had a graduating class of 40.
