WHEAT UNCHANGED AFTER RAGGED DAY

CHICAGO, May 23 (AP) — After swinging erratically from net losses of a cent a bushel to gains of as much as 2 cents, wheat prices today closed with little change compared with yesterday's finish.

A midsession outburst of buying associated with rumors the president is prepared to sign the 85 per cent of parity loan rate bill caused the extreme advance. Later Washington reports indicated an agreement had been reached between the administration and congressional farm leaders on the loan rate legislation which, together, would give producers 100 per cent of parity return.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1c lower compared with yesterday, July 97½c, September 98½c; Corn 1½c higher, July 73½c, September 74½c; Oats unchanged to 1c higher.

Van Vector to Give Opinion on Barber Ordinance Monday

City Attorney Dayton Van Vector said Friday he expects to have an opinion prepared for Monday night's council meeting on the legal status of the city barber shop closing ordinance.

Councilmen asked Van Vector for an opinion after barbers came to the council last meeting with a proposal that the ordinance be changed to provide for closing at 6 p. m. instead of 9 p. m. on Saturday nights.

This immediately developed into a discussion of the desirability and legal status of an ordinance of this nature.

Saying that if the ordinance wouldn't hold up in court, he thought it ought to be thrown out, Councilman Rollin Cantrall moved for repeal instead of amendment of the old ordinance. Later he withdrew the motion until Van Vector could prepare a formal opinion for the council.



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
