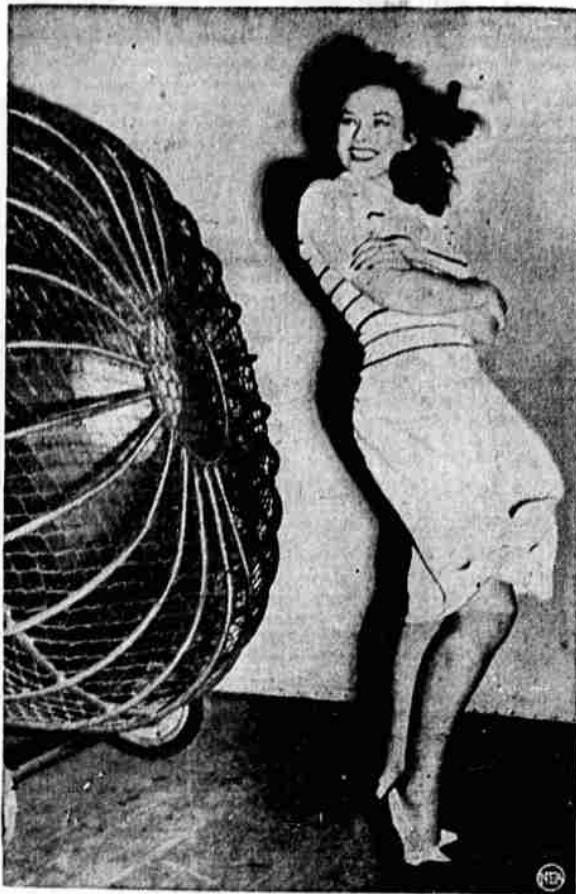

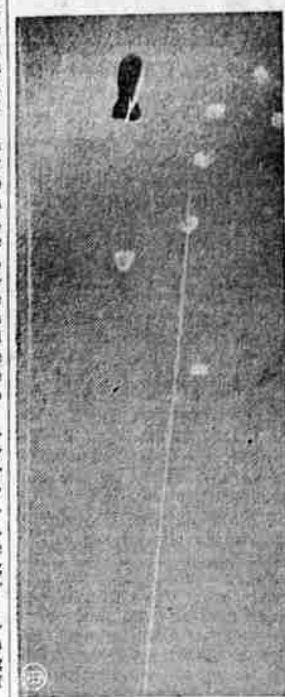
NANNIE MAY CANTRALL
