CONFERENCES ON SEASONALITY SET

About 900 employers whose payroll records indicate seasonal layoffs are being called to 11 conferences throughout the state during June by the unemployment compensation commission.

Weekly wage reports for the four-year period, 1937-40, will be asked of these employers in an effort to find out whether they are "seasonal" within the meaning of the law as amended by the recent legislature. Seasonal firms must have been shut down during the same consecutive 12-week period for each of the four years. This shutdown is defined as less than 45 percent of the three highest four-week payrolls during that year.

Determinations made by unemployment commission representatives as a result of these records will be in force for two benefit years, 1942 and 1943.

CITY TO MARK MEMORIAL DAY WITH SERVICE

Klamath Falls will observe Memorial day on Friday and fitting tribute to the soldier and sailor dead will be paid by veteran organizations throughout the city, it was announced Wednesday by Samuel P. Miller, chairman of the Memorial day parade.

these services, the organizations will march in a body from the armory to the Linkville cemetery where the Veterans of Foreign Wars will conduct a ceremony.

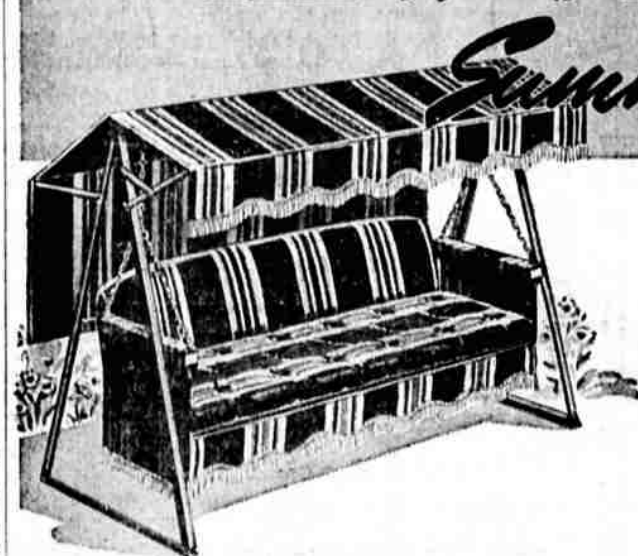

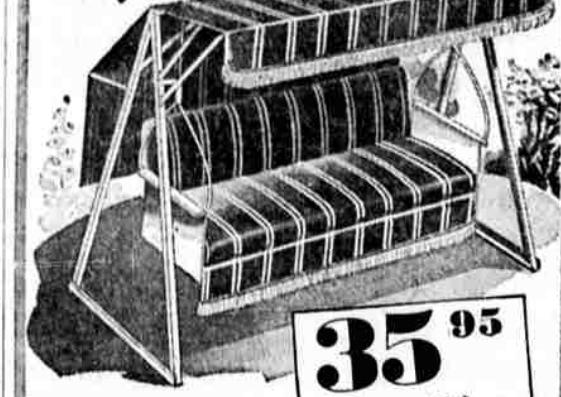
