Judge Denies Motion To Declare Federal Jury Bill Illegal

PORTLAND, Ore., May 30 (AP)—A motion to quash a federal indictment of Harold H. Conner and Frank C. Hiller on charges of kidnapping was overruled yesterday by Federal Judge James A. Fee.

Leroy L. Lomax, attorney for Conner, contended that the indictment returned by a grand jury here, was illegal because women were excluded from federal juries in Oregon.

However, Judge Fee supported Mason Dillard, assistant attorney general, who held that it was "a legally constituted jury and a legal indictment and that rights of the defendants have not been violated."

Trial dates will be set later. Hiller and Conner are accused of picking up a girl in downtown Portland last January and transporting her against her will to a point beyond Vancouver, Wash.

AFL Threatens to Spread Ward Strike

PORTLAND, Ore., May 30 (AP)—Unless Montgomery Ward and company deals with local strikers, the AFL executive board will sanction a spread of strikes to other units, Jack Estabrook said yesterday.

Estabrook, AFL Warehousemen's union secretary, said that approximately two-thirds of the store's striking employees were now employed at other jobs. The store closed recently after being picketed since December.

SUPER JIGSAW PUZZLE SHOWN TO PASSERSBY

The solution to a super jigsaw puzzle in the window of the US National Bank building, Eighth and Main streets, is attracting the interest of passersby this week.

The huge Indian "olla" or pottery jug was found by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Payne of California while on a month's trip to the southwest this spring. Broken into 60 pieces, it was lying on the sandy floor of a rock shelter on a ranch near Aguanga, Calif., owned by Harry Bergman who gave them permission to remove the fragments.

The Paynes planned to restore the olla by cementing the pieces together. They were disappointed on doing so, to find that a large proportion of the jug was still missing. The fitted pieces, however, formed a complete circle of the neck, so Payne determined to complete the restoration by casting in the missing parts. This process required the use of 15 pounds of plaster.

In fitting the pieces together, a penciled inscription was found on one of them. It was signed by Harry Bergman, who said he had completely forgotten having written it. The message was as follows:

"There were three very nice ollas here and one that was destroyed by the earthquake of Christmas morning at 4 a. m., 1898. The Bradford girls, daughters of Bill Bradford, found this cave and contents about 1918. I think they must have carried away part of the neck of this one."

In the same bank window are two smaller ollas which Mr. and Mrs. Payne found unbroken in rock shelters on a mountain strewn with enormous granite boulders near Puchanga, Calif. The smaller one, when found, contained acorns badly charred by a fire which had swept the area.

These ollas, according to Payne, were fashioned of clay by the Pala Indians who used them for storage purposes and are probably several hundred years old. The Indians formerly lived in the mountainous country southeast of the Salton sea in the summer, migrating to the desert country in the winter months.

Before leaving the mountains, they would gather acorns and store them in the hidden ollas, thus insuring a supply of food on their return in the spring.

Occasionally, some of the Indians would not come back from the desert. The superstitious beliefs of the tribesmen deterred them from disturbing possessions of the dead. These ollas and those left when the coming of the white man interrupted the usual customs of the Indians still may be found, although they are becoming increasingly rare.

Wool Market Coasts During Week As Prices Keep Firm

BOSTON, May 30 (AP)—The commercial bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The wool market has coasted along this week with no material change in the volume of character of sales. Prices are firm for all descriptions."

"While there is interest in the presidential proclamation of an unlimited emergency, it is felt that the behavior of the wool market has been good enough so that there need not be any interference with the normal course of the market in consequence of this proclamation."

"Western operations have been somewhat scattered but a fair volume of business has been taken at firm rates, both in fine and medium wool sections."

"Foreign primary markets are without any marked change, prices being firmly maintained everywhere."

"Manufacturers are operating at practical capacity with a backlog of orders sufficient to run to the end of the year in men's wear, while women's wear lines are expanding."

"Mohair is rather quiet but firm."
