BIBLE SCHOOL SET TO START HERE MONDAY

The daily vacation Bible school will start Monday morning, June 2, at 9 o'clock. This school is held each year by the Klamath Falls Ministerial association.

For those children living in the east part of the city all departments will be held in the First Nazarene church, the corner of Garden and Martin streets. It is urged that those teachers who are to work in the school and living in this area will help with the school, and the parents living in this area will send their children to the school held in the First Nazarene church.

The school held downtown will be held in two separate churches. The beginners and primary departments will be held in the First Presbyterian church. The juniors and intermediates will be held in the First Christian church.

A fine group of teachers will be in charge of the school this year, with an excellent program of Bible study, music and craft work. The class work will be between the hours of 9 to 12 o'clock each morning from Monday through Friday. The school will be held for only two weeks, from June 2 to June 13.

The vacation Bible school which began at the Altamont Junior high school on Thursday, May 22, enrolled 135 the first day. Attendance has been, second day 140, third day 133, fourth day 166, fifth day 145, sixth day 152. The total enrollment at the end of the sixth day was 208.
