Chief of Fascist
Militia Replaced

ROME, May 30 (AP)—Replacement of Lieutenant General Achille Starace, former secretary of the fascist party, as chief of staff of the fascist militia, was announced officially today.

Premier Mussolini appointed Lieutenant General Enzo Galbiati to the post which Starace had held since January, 1940, when Ettore Muti replaced him as party secretary.

Muti, now a war pilot, later was succeeded by Adelchi Serena.

The announcement, without stating the reason, merely said Starace had left the position May 25.

The fascist militia is a combat organization of blackshirt battalions fighting alongside regular army regiments in various divisions of Italy's armed forces.
