RAF middle east headquarters said British bombers had dropped food and medical supplies to isolated groups of allied troops still left on Crete and that long formations of RAF warplanes patrolled the Mediterranean to protect "his majesty's ships and merchant vessels" removing soldiers from the island.

Klamath farmers overwhelmingly approved wheat marketing quotas by a vote of 5 to 1 in a referendum poll held Saturday for the communities of Klamath Falls, Malin-Merrill, Henley-Keno, and Bonanza-Poe Valley, C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent, announced.

About 40 per cent of the nearly 200 eligible voters cast ballots in Klamath county, the Bonanza-Poe Valley district leading with 24 "yes" votes and four "no." Henley-Keno voted 15 yes, 4 no; Malin-Merrill, 11 yes, none no, 3 votes challenged; Klamath Falls, 10 yes, 4 no, 5 challenged

RESTAURANTS ASK MORE WAGE PARLEYS

Local restaurant employers Saturday afternoon asked for further negotiations or arbitration on new wage scale demands made by the Culinary alliance. It was learned Monday.

The alliance is seeking a 50-cent per day wage boost for all cooks, waitresses, dishwashers and bartenders employed by over 40 local eating and drinking establishments. A majority of employers have either signed or have indicated they will sign the new contract but eleven are fighting the increase. Of the eleven, three are among the largest restaurants on Main street.

A statement released by H. C. Merryman, attorney for the Klamath Falls Restaurant and Caterers association, said the present scale in Klamath Falls is in line with that in Portland and Seattle, two large cities booming with defense activity. Merryman gave the following reasons for restaurant operators' insistence on maintaining the old contract:

"1. The contract now in operation is as high as any in the state, higher than any except Portland.

"2. The present wage scale gives the employes on an average 31 per cent of the gross revenue in the houses operating under the union scale. This is already six per cent higher than the national average.

"3. Employes are not underpaid at this time. Waitresses are receiving \$3 per day plus meals, which amounts to at least \$100 per month; dishwashers the same, and cooks from \$100 per month plus meals to \$170 plus meals. This could hardly be called low wages.

"4. The new wage scale demands \$3.50 per day plus meals for waitresses, and \$4 if the shift is split in any way. This constitutes a 33 1/3 increase in wages, an amount which could only be compensated by a wholesale raise in the price of food served.

"5. Food prices are already soaring, which means that employes receiving food as part of their compensation have already had a substantial raise in wages. Rents and other expenses in Klamath Falls have not advanced with advancing food costs.

"6. Restaurants getting their revenue from the service of food should not be classed with poolrooms, night clubs, and pool-room lunch counters, which secure their chief revenue from other sources than the sale of food and which have readily agreed to the new scale, which would be ruinous to restaurants. They should also not be classed with hotels which are allowed concession of lower wages, split shifts, and Filipino employes where desired."

to induce the state to take over the Sprague River road as a secondary highway and take advantage of the funds authorized through the federal government.

C. S. Scharfenstein of Klamath Falls, who is just home from Washington, conferred there with Senators Holman and McNary and Congressman Pierce

on the Sprague road problem. He said he received a sympathetic hearing from all three and that before he left it was apparent that favorable action was forthcoming.

Reclamation officials were jubilant over the reported boost in the dump project appropriation.

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—To speed completion of the developments, the senate appropriations committee recommended the financing of seven reclamation projects out of the general treasury as it reported a \$185-

110,000 interior department supply bill to the senate today. The bill, as it emerged from the committee, carried \$82,726,000 for construction of western irrigation works in the next fiscal year.

The amount was \$3,792,000 more than allowed by the house, a reduction of \$3,000,000 in the house-approved total of \$34,750,000 for the California central project being more than offset by the committee's action increasing the Grand Coulee dam appropriation to \$11,000,000 from \$8,000,000 and by other increases.

Projects the committee said should be financed out of the general treasury instead of out of a special reclamation fund which has been found inadequate, and the recommended appropriation for each were:

The committee made the following increases in house totals for various projects: Payette division of Boise project, Ida., from \$500,000 to \$1,500,000; Sun River, Mont., from \$50,000 to \$100,000; Deschutes project, Ore., from \$400,000 to \$1,000,000; Klamath project, Ore.-Calif., from \$200,000 to \$500,000.
