House Approves Vice Admiral Bill

WASHINGTON, June 2 (P)—The house passed without debate and sent to the senate today legislation permitting President Roosevelt to appoint an unlimited number of vice admirals to have charge of "special and unusual" missions of naval forces. At a recent house naval committee hearing, high naval officials said the new vice admirals could command "task forces" separated from the fleets for special duty. No indication was given at the time as to where these task forces would be sent.

SPRAGUE TO NAME DEFENSE COUNCIL

SALEM, June 2 (P)—Paving the way for enlistment of thousands of Oregon citizens in volunteer defense activities, Governor Charles A. Sprague said he would appoint a state civilian defense council late today or tomorrow.

The council, to cooperate with the national civilian defense administration, will consist of about 27 members, representing every section of the state. The council probably will hold its first meeting here next week. It will supervise the enrollment of civilians to act as airplane spotters, fire fighters, and in bomb disaster squads.

Governor Sprague said he would appoint county civilian defense councils within two weeks.

The state civilian defense council will concentrate on enlistment of civilians for defense emergencies, while the 18-member industrial development committee, to meet here Friday for the first time, will seek to obtain defense industries for the state.
