

# Pelicans Split Two Weekend Loop Tilts

## Drop 6-4 Game With Albany, Shade Toledo, 5-4, Sunday

Klamath's road-weary Pelicans arrived home late Sunday night with an even break in two league games over the weekend, dropping a 6-4 decision to the first-place Albany Alcos Saturday night and earning a 5-4 victory over the Toledo Mud Hens Sunday afternoon, to take over second place in loop standings with two wins and a single loss in three contests.

Meanwhile the Albany nine, 1940 State circuit champs, were scoring three consecutive triumphs in successive days to take over indisputed possession of the top spot in the league rankings. The Alcos easily rimmed Eugene, 14-2, in a Memorial day clash and Hills Creek, 10-3, in a Sunday encounter but had a tougher time with Klamath Falls, winning only 6-4.

## Three J.C. Marks Topple As Sacramento Wins at Denver

DENVER, June 2 (UP)—Sacramento, Calif., Junior college won the national junior college track and field meet in Denver university stadium Saturday as three records were toppled and Hal Davis failed again to live up to his billing as the "world's fastest human."

Sacramento, with dusky Joe Batiste, its "one-man" track team, scoring 29 points, had a comfortable margin over Compton, Calif., Junior college, runner-up to Los Angeles City college in 1940. Compton scored 68.25 points to Sacramento's 60.15.

Santa Ana, Calif., Junior college finished third with 50 points, and Davis' Salinas, Calif., team was fourth with 44. From that point on the teams were strung out with 20 of the 30 entrants scoring at least one point.

Davis, expected to run the 100-yard dash in about 9.4 seconds — the world's record —

could do no better than tie his 9.8 qualifying time of yesterday. He won by two steps over Browning. His time was one-tenth of a second off his 1940 meet record of 9.5 as was his winning time in the 220-yard dash. Davis breastst the tape three strides ahead of Joe Hylton of Pasadena, Calif., Junior college in 20.7 seconds. His meet record for the 220 is 20.6.

Batiste smashed the day-old record of Walt Smith of Santa Ana, Calif., Junior college, winning the 220-low hurdles in 23.4 seconds yesterday in leading the qualifiers. Smith topped the low barriers in 23.8 seconds to break the old meet mark of 24 seconds flat, set by Richey Browning of Visalia, Calif., Junior college last year. Browning was third in today's finals, with Smith second.

# Cal Runner Ties World 440 Record

Klemmer Runs :46.4 as USC Sweeps Coast Meet; Les Steers Leaps 6'9"

BERKELEY, Calif., June 2 (UP)—Grover Klemmer, long-legged University of California sophomore, Saturday equalled the world's record of 46.4 seconds in the 440 run but University of Southern California's balanced power easily won the Pacific Coast conference track and field championships.

USC rolled up 73 points, winning five events, to capture the team championship. California was second with 481, and Stanford.

**BERKELEY, Calif., June 2 (AP)**—Slow-motion pictures may decide whether Stanford or Washington State placed third in the Pacific coast conference track and field meet Saturday.

Photographs of the 100-yard dash, won by Kjell Ovale of University of Washington in 9.8 seconds, seem to bear out the contention of many observers that Pat Haley of Washington State finished third instead of Clifford Bourland of U. S. C.

If slow-motion pictures show the judges that Haley took third it would give Washington State enough points to nose out Stanford.

ford and Washington State tied for third with 24 each. Other point standings were Idaho 14, UCLA 12, Washington 8, Oregon 8, Montana 6 and Oregon State 6.

Klemmer's smashing victory in the 440, in which he was not pressed, tied the world mark set by Blazing Ben Eastman of Stanford back in 1932.

Besides Klemmer's mark, four other new conference records were established. In the mile run Phil Leibowitz of Idaho was timed at 4:09.3, breaking the old mark of 4:11.6 made by Louis Zamperini of USC last year.

Les Steers of Oregon, unofficial world record holder, failed to better his mark of 6 feet, 10 1/2 inches in the high jump, but he broke the conference record of 6 feet, 7 inches made by John Wilson of USC last year. Wilson jumped 6 feet, 8 inches today for second place. Steers easily cleared 6 feet, 9 inches.

Bob Peoples of USC cracked the javelin record by seven feet. He tossed the spear 231 feet 1 inch to break the mark of 224 feet, 14 inches set by Boyd Brown of Oregon in 1939.

The half mile climaxed the record-breaking performances. Bill Dale of Washington State barely nosed out Clarence Barnes of California. The winning time was 1:51.7, cracking the record of 1:52.3 established by Ross Bush of USC in 1937.
