with his major domo, but showed signs of a relapse later, approached a crisis at 8 p. m., and shortly thereafter lost consciousness.

The Hohenzollern flag flew at half-staff from Castle Doorn. With Hitler's explicit permission, the flag of the former ruling Prussian house also flew at half-staff from The Netherlands palace, now the administration building of the Hohenzollern family, and from the palace of William I, both in Berlin.

Wilhelm was said to have expressed the wish that the only mourners at his funeral be innermost members of his family circle, but DNB said "some delegations from the reich are expected."

The German press declared that post-war research had absolved the Kaiser of world war guilt, but Dienst Aus Deutschland, Nazi news commentary, added that he "carried a great deal of responsibility for loss of the war."

At a crucial time, it said, the German people "had to leave full power and far-reaching decisions to a weak stomach."

The "old man of Doorn," who in his time commanded the world's mightiest military machine, regarded the ascendancy of Adolf Hitler to the leadership of the reich in 1933 as "a step in the right direction."

He followed the present war painstakingly as though he had a commanding position at the Nazi general headquarters. He marked the progress of the Nazi war machine by affixing tiny flags on detailed maps of European countries and by maintaining a remarkably complete index of naval and merchant shipping losses.

Oil shortage in East prophesied

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estimated that Japan now is importing 60,000 to 70,000 barrels daily of oil from the United States, sending ships to the west coast for it.

Oil experts pointed out, however, the Japanese imports from this country bore little if any relation to the threatened petroleum shortage in eastern states, since the deficiency would result from lack of transportation from the southwestern oil fields to the east rather than a shortage of production and refining facilities.

The shortage, petroleum experts said, will begin in the east in July and become progressively more acute during the autumn months.

To combat the approaching scarcity and to keep it from curtailing defense production, they recommended that rigid restrictions be imposed on the use of oil. Specifically, it was suggested that "gasless Sundays" be started, and that the temperature in oil-heated homes be kept five degrees lower this winter. No federal program has yet been formulated, however.

RESTAURANT WAGE PARLEY DEADLOCKED

The current Klamath restaurant employers-culinary alliance wage scale situation remained at a deadlock Wednesday after a long evening meeting Tuesday night between negotiating committees of both parties.

No agreement was reached at the parley, both sides stated.

According to H. C. Merryman, attorney for the Restaurant and Caterers' association, the employer group reiterated their request that the old contract which expired last Saturday be maintained for the coming year.

The alliance is seeking a 50-cent per day wage boost for bartenders, cooks, waitresses and dishwashers, which would bring the base dishwasher and waitress scale to \$3.50. Employers, pointing to the present \$3 scale in Portland and Seattle, are holding out for the same level.

No future meetings were scheduled when last night's conference broke up but two meetings of Culinary alliance members were announced by Secretary G. C. Tatman for Thursday at 3 p. m. at 8 p. m. in the Labor temple.

It was presumed that a report of negotiations would be carried back to the membership. What further action would be made was not known.

LA POINTE'S WINS NATIONAL CONTEST

TWO SPRAGUE RIVER MILLS EYED BY AFL

The Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) this week will make demands for union recognition in the two Sprague River lumber firms, Organizer Joe Boyd said Tuesday.

The union is prepared to prove their claim to a majority at both the Crater Lake Box and Lumber company and the Hoesley Logging company, Boyd stated.

Employees of both firms have been working under an agreement recognizing the Industrial Employees union as their bargaining agent until last week when IEU headquarters announced the disbanding of their organization throughout the entire northwest. At the time of disbandment IEU members were urged to join the AFL.

Meanwhile in three other former IEU mills the AFL was claiming a majority and placing charters. The three, all in the Rogue River valley, were the Medford corporation, employing approximately 400 men; the Ingram Lumber company at Gledale, Ore., and the Timber Products company of Medford.

Delegates from the three mill groups will attend a meeting of the Klamath District council here next Sunday, Boyd said.

AFL UNION REPORTS SIGNING WITH SHAW

A collective bargaining agreement between the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) and the Shaw Lumber company was reported Wednesday to have been signed Tuesday night following the recent AFL victory at an NLRB election poll.

According to AFL Organizer Joe Boyd, the contract was signed by J. R. Shaw for the company and John Shirney and Marshall Coate, president and secretary of the AFL local 2544.

The following five points were reportedly granted the union by the new contract:

1. Sole collective bargaining rights.
2. An unrestricted plant committee to handle grievances.
3. Promotions and filling of vacancies on the basis of strict seniority.
4. Voluntary submission of disputes to arbitration.
5. Safety provisions.

The AFL was recently declared sole bargaining agent by the National Labor Relations board following two board elections. The first, resulting in no majority between the CIO, the AFL and "no-union," was decided when the AFL decisively whipped the rival union in a runoff poll.

BIG LAKES WORKERS APPROVE AFL UNION

Employees of the Big Lakes Lumber and Box company Tuesday voiced approval of the American Federation of Labor as their exclusive bargaining agent at the Klamath Falls plant, Joe Boyd, AFL organizer, announced last night.

Of a total of 288 employees eligible to vote in the NLRB consent election, 181 ballots were marked in favor of AFL, Boyd said, while only 83 workers wanted "no union," making 264 votes cast. Twenty-four eligible employees failed to vote.

Vessels Released
