PET-OWNERS SEEK POISON SPREADER

High Income Tax Hinders Luring Rich to California

SACRAMENTO, June 5 (UP)—California's high personal income tax, equalled only by North Dakota on the higher brackets, probably has kept away a good many wealthy persons who otherwise might have made their permanent home in California.

There have been several proposals to lower this tax, on the premise that the rich should be encouraged to live in California so the state would have the advantage of large collections on the inheritance tax, gift tax, sales tax, gasoline tax and other expenditures.

Apparently something will come of the idea this year, chiefly through the efforts of State Senator Clarence C. Ward of Santa Barbara, who has a great many wealthy residents in his district.

Ward proposed a bill which would lower the income tax from the present top maximum of 15 per cent to a new high of 8 per cent, with a graduated schedule downwards. He argued it would affect only 914 persons now living in the state and would bring a loss of only \$1,600,000 annually "which will be more than compensated for by increased tax collections, employment and return on the inheritance tax."

Ward was successful in passing out his tax bill in the senate on the same day the upper house approved a resolution objecting to tax reductions at this time. He argued his measure was not a tax cut but more of an equalizer which would bring the state more revenue in the long run.

The measure went through the assembly last weekend (May 30) without a dissenting voice and by a vote of 50 to 17. Assemblyman Alfred Robertson, also of Santa Barbara, made a fine presentation in the lower house.

He pointed out that only North Dakota has a 15 per cent top with California, whereas of the 36 states having income taxes, 27 have maximum rates ranging from 1 to 7 per cent, five at 8 per cent, and one at 10 per cent. He explained that federal income taxes now reach a maximum of more than 80 per cent, with the state tax on top of that, since no deduction is allowed for the federal tax.

The assembly passage sent the bill to the governor, where it will be signed, vetoed, or permitted to go into effect automatically without his signature.

The new schedule, if it becomes law, will be as follows: On net incomes up to \$5000, 1 per cent; \$5000 to \$10,000, 2 per cent; \$10,000 to \$15,000, 3 per cent; \$15,000 to \$20,000, 4 per cent; \$20,000 to \$25,000, 5 per cent; \$25,000 to \$30,000, 6 per cent; \$30,000 to \$40,000, 7 per cent; \$40,000 to \$50,000, 8 per cent; \$50,000 to \$60,000, 9 per cent; \$60,000 to \$70,000, 10 per cent; \$70,000 to \$80,000, 11 per cent; \$80,000 to \$90,000, 12 per cent; \$90,000 to \$100,000, 13 per cent; \$100,000 to \$150,000, 14 per cent; \$150,000 to \$200,000, 15 per cent; \$200,000 to \$300,000, 16 per cent; \$300,000 to \$500,000, 17 per cent; \$500,000 to \$1,000,000, 18 per cent; \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000, 19 per cent; \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000, 20 per cent; \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000, 21 per cent; \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000, 22 per cent; \$20,000,000 to \$50,000,000, 23 per cent; \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000, 24 per cent; \$100,000,000 to \$500,000,000, 25 per cent; \$500,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000, 26 per cent; 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
