DEATH OF SPRAGUE RESIDENT MOURNED

SPRAGUE RIVER — One of the best known and most colorful Indian women of the Sprague River district is gone. The community was shocked to learn Monday morning that Mamie Crume had passed away after a short illness in the Klamath Agency hospital. For 17 years Mrs. Crume had been especially prominent in the various activities of the school and community. Each morning she brought her carload of children to school, often dropping in to have a friendly chat with the teachers. At school functions, athletic events of community ventures Mamie and her family came early and supported the affairs with generosity and enthusiasm. Her last public appearance was at the school picnic late in May. Although her health had been failing for the last year she did not let this impair her usual activity.

Four of the Crume children attended the Sprague River school. They were prominent in athletics and music. Mrs. Crume was very anxious that the children get a good education and come out of school prepared to help the people of her race.

The people of Sprague River will greatly miss Mamie Crume and the sympathy of the entire community is extended to her husband, Sylvan Crume, and the children, Wilfred, Ramona, Patsey and Irwin.
