A's Triumph Over White Sox, 9 to 3

Bosox Tromple Cleveland Indians, 14-1; National Contests Dampened

Chicago White Sox Pilot Jimmy Dykes has been collecting abundant praise for his managerial magic with castoff players this season, particularly former Philadelphia Athletics performers, but the shoe went on the other foot Thursday.

Former White Sox Right-handed Pitcher Jack Knott put the Dykes' crew into reverse as he pitched the A's to a 9-3 triumph.

Wally Moses paced the A's nine-hit blast which sent Starter Ed Smith to the showers by the second inning. Moses collected a triple and a single and drove in four runs.

Mickey Harris unfurled a six-hitter as the Boston Red Sox

handed the Cleveland Indians their worst defeat of the season, 14-1. The Red Sox pined out 10 singles, three doubles, a triple and two homers—one each by Dom DiMaggio and Ted Williams—off three helpless Indian pitchers.

Bruce Campbell's 10th-inning single with the bases loaded gave the Detroit Tigers a 5-4 decision over the New York Yankees. Tommy Henrich homered with one on in the ninth to tie the score for the Yanks.

The St. Louis Browns presented their new manager, Luke Sewell, with their longest winning streak of the year—three straight—as they beat the Washington Senators, 4-2.

All National league games were rained out.

Even with the Los Angeles fog we have been having lately, the fishing has improved in some places. At most of the popular lakes fishing conditions are going from bad to worse.

DIAMOND LAKE should show some improvement... however little would do a lot of good. Bait fishing with cluster eggs is by far the best method to date.

THE BIG MARSH and MARSH CREEK are now in good shape. Worms are best as bait and about the only real bait.

THE CHEWAUCAN RIVER has been good all week and I think for those that make the trip, single eggs will probably be best. In fact, most all of the creeks and streams south of Klamath Falls should be worth a trip.

GERBER DAM if you like plenty of perch and crappie. Some bass have been caught there this week and more should be putting in an appearance soon.

THE UPPER LAKE fishing is good with some big fish being caught every day. Rocky Point and Harrison lodge resorts are very enthusiastic in their reports and about all you need is a jiggar wobbler or andy recker and the inclination.

ODELL LAKE still reports nice fishing with most of the fish being caught on trolls. Strips of white fish or worms about two feet behind the flasher works best.

FISH LAKE should be good. Bait fishing with worms will be best.

The smaller lakes to the north are all being fished, and with limits to almost everyone I have talked to. The trip in, for the most part, has to be in the form of a pack trip and skiing trip without the skis. Most of the lakes are free of ice, but the surrounding country is still covered with snow.

THE ROGUE RIVER and the small creeks in and around Union creek all report fish being caught, with some nice fly fishing being enjoyed. Salmon flies and olive cowdun are popular with buck coachman running a close second.

THE DESCHUTES RIVER below Bend has been very good. This side of Bend quite a few out-of-town people have been fishing it with very good luck. Flies work as good as anything



Denny Shute Fires 69 for Open Golf Lead; Harrison, Ghezzi Turn in 70's; Texans Trail

FORT WORTH, Texas, June 6 (UP)—Denny Shute of Chicago, who is a walking mass of surgeons' scars, did a little operating himself Thursday by cutting one stroke off of par and seizing the lead in the national open golf championship.

His brilliant 69 across the long Colonial club layout was a great comeback for a man whose golf career was threatened a few months ago by an operation on his wrist.

No other man in the field of 163 could break the par 70 on this tough, skinny course. Shute slipped over par on two holes on the out nine, but got one birdie.

There are 54 holes still to go and plenty of the nation's top-flight golfers are within striking distance of Shute. Dutch Harrison, also from Chicago, put together a pair of 35s for a 70. So did Vic Ghezzi of Deal, N. J. The rest of the field was strung along all the way up to 90.

most came to a home-town boy—Henry Ransom—who burned up the first nine in 31. That

score equalled the lowest nine holes ever shot in a national open. Willie MacFarlane had a 31 when he won the open in 1925. No man could keep up that pace for more than nine holes, but few men would have blown as high as Ransom did. He needed 41 strokes on the back nine and took a 72.

At 71 are Gene Kunes, Jug McSpadden, Defending Champion Lawson Little, Dick Metz and Jack Ryan.

Bracketed with Ransom at 72 are Bunny Torpey, Dodson, Mo., Johnny Morris, Tuscaloosa, Ala., Clayton Heafner, Bill Kaiser, Louisville, Ky., Harry Todd of Dallas, low amateur for the day, and Ted Kroll, New Hartford, N. Y.

Eugene Meets Pelican Nine Here On Weekend

Ball Games Set for Saturday and Sunday at Local Recreation Park

It will be a vastly-improved Eugene State league nine that invades Klamath Falls this weekend to meet the Pelicans in a two-game series that opens Saturday night with an exhibition contest and closes Sunday afternoon with the regularly-scheduled loop encounter that counts in the official standings.

The Athletics have had an in-and-out season thus far this year, trouncing the Toledo Mud Hens, 10-2, several weeks ago in the season's opener and suffering a 14-2 lacing at the hands of the Albany Alcos Memorial day. But Manager Andy Hurney of the Eugene club this week added considerable strength with the signing of Dick Whitman, Bill Carney and Don Kirsch, all members of this year's slugging University of Oregon baseball squad.

Whitman Eyed
Outfielder Whitman, who captained the Duck varsity in this, his year of competition, led his team in batting with a .408 average. Carney, also an outfielder, and Kirsch, regular second baseman, were not far behind Whitman in the hitting department. Manager Hurney expects to use Whitman in center field, Carney in left field and Kirsch at shortstop in the Athletic lineup this week against the Pelicans.

Remainder of the Eugene starters for the Saturday night and Sunday clashes with the Klamath team probably will be Norman "Nig" Mebesius at first base, Barney Koch on second, either Koch or Bill Hamel on third, Hurney in right field, Dick Bishop at the catching slot and Joe Spencer and Pete Igoue slated for the pitching duties.

Reports from Eugene indicate that the aforementioned lineup is the strongest ever to represent that city in the State league. Athletic supporters rate Catcher Bishop in the class of the circuit at his position, and past performances seem to bear out that contention.

New Hurler
Fans who come out for the games this week at Recreation field are expected to witness a whole of a series since both clubs are believed to be at full strength. Both games are slated for nine innings with the Saturday engagement to start at 8 p. m. and the Sunday fracas to get underway at 2 p. m. Season tickets will be good for the Sunday tilt only with the usual 40-cent admission for adults to be charged Saturday night.

Manager Ernie Bishop of the Pelicans announced Thursday night that Burt Swope, recently released by the Salem Senators, had signed a Klamath contract and will pitch the Sunday contest against the Athletics. Swope worked out against the Pelican aggregation Wednesday night when he twirled five innings for the Dorris Lumberjacks, striking out five men and allowing but four singles.

Bill Hanauska, the Willamette university pitcher, will go to the hillock Saturday night in the first games of the series while Orin avils and Clyde Carlstrom will be called upon for relief action if the occasion arises. Third Baseman Babe Schwab may also throw a few pitches from the mound.

President Bob Howard of the Pelican Baseball club Thursday emphasized the fact that season tickets for six Klamath home games are still on sale for \$2 and may be secured from him, Secretary-Treasurer Don Druliner, Directors Frank Snyder, Pete Lesmeister, Lynn Roycroft and Al Dollard, or at the box office at Recreation field.
