

STOCK PRICES SLIP DOWN ON TIMID MARKET

NEW YORK, June 6 (P)—Stock prices slid unevenly lower today in a timid market. Turnover was about 350,000 shares.

Running in sharp contrast to the general trend was stock of Jones and Laughlin steel. The preferred jumped more than 5 points in the stock exchange and the common climbed around 2 in the curb on a rumor that \$47 of accumulated preferred dividends might soon be paid, clearing the way for common dividends.

As far as actual news developments were concerned, there was none sufficiently significant to force operators into anything approaching real action.

Even the Jones and Laughlin exhibition was accomplished on the basis of only a moderate number of shares.

Numbered among the steadier issues of the day were Bethlehem, Sperry, Consolidated Aircraft, New York Central, Owens-Illinois and Union Carbide. On the outside most of the time were DuPont, Caterpillar, Santa Fe, American Smelting, Air Reduction, American Telephone and Fajardo Sugar, the last reaching a new 1941 low.

WHEAT PRICE UP AS LOANS FIXED

CHICAGO, June 6 (P)—Wheat prices rose almost two cents today following announcement of government loan rates which confirmed trade belief that new wheat would be worth as collateral approximately 34 cents a bushel more than the 1940 crop.

At highs of around 99 cents a bushel for July delivery and \$1.00 for September, however, futures contracts were 15 cents or more below the loan rate on a Chicago basis.

Heavy, unwanted rains in the southwest, with prospects of more moisture the next few days, stimulated talk about a wet, delayed harvest. Renewed support was attributed to mills. Wheat closed 11-1/2c higher than yesterday, July 98 1/2-99c, September \$1.00 1/2-1; corn 1-1/2c up, July 73 1/2-74c, September 75-74 1/2c; oats 1/2c off to 1c up.

Scattered sales of moderate volume were closed on clothing territory wools. Prices for these clothing wools ranged mostly 96-98 cents, scoured basis, for fine, 93-95 cents, scoured basis, for half-blood and 66-68 cents, scoured basis, for three-eighths blood. Sales were moderate in spot foreign wools and orders to future delivery were being placed in Australia.
