

UNIONS RACE TO ORGANIZE SPRAGUE MILL

SPRAGUE RIVER—The first round in the fight for union membership for workers of the Crater Lake Box and Lumber company mill and woods crew and the Hoesley Logging company got under way Wednesday night when Joe Clark, CIO representative, addressed a meeting of laborers in the old school gymnasium.

Clark explained the various policies of the organization after which numerous questions were asked. Chief among the points brought up was discussion of who controls the membership, what can be gained by affiliation and the means of gaining aims by the union.

The group of men represented sympathizers from both sides and the discussion, though orderly, brought out several controversial issues. Clark announced that the meetings would be held each Tuesday night until the time the national labor relations board arranges for the election.

Thursday night is set for the AFL side of the question, with Organizer Joe Boyd leading the drive.

The Klamath county delegation will return home about 7 p. m. Friday, June 20. Those boys and girls getting off at Chiloquin will arrive approximately 40 minutes earlier.

Mr. Seymour, state 4-H club leader, has announced that the program for summer school, including classes, recreation, sports and activities is complete and that the program this year includes several new activities, with a group of activities presenting greater variety of recreation for the girls in the afternoons. Many of the club members from Klamath Falls are planning to make the annual coast trip on Sunday, June 15. This trip is not covered in the regular \$12 registration fee. Cost for the trip is \$2.

4-H CLUBS PLEDGE TO PREVENT FIRES

PORTLAND, June 6—More than 900 4-H boys and girls of Lane county have signed the Keep Oregon Green pledge and have thus qualified to wear the Keep Oregon Green junior pin, according to John B. Woods, executive secretary of the association dedicated to keeping forest fires out of the state this year.

The Lane county junior foresters who have pledged support to the campaign are under the leadership of R. C. Kuehner, who has developed one of the outstanding 4-H club forestry projects in the state.

Pins are now available to give boys and girls in other counties an opportunity to sign the junior pledge and receive buttons. The junior pledge reads:

1. I will be sure my match is out. To be doubly sure, I will break it before throwing it away.
2. I will not throw burning material of any kind from the window of any vehicle, whether moving or standing still.
3. I will not smoke at all in the dry summer woods of Oregon.
4. I will dig down to bare, damp soil before building a campfire. And I will remove all inflammable material from around the fire circle.
5. I will never leave camp before the fire is out—dead out. I will pour water or pack earth over the fire, stirring the coals to make sure no spark is left alive.
6. I will not burn brush or slash in windy weather. I will get a permit from fire warden or ranger before burning.
7. Should I see a fire burning unattended, I will notify the nearest fire warden or ranger. I will act.

AFL Strike Ended At Spokane Plant

SPOKANE, June 6 (P)—A strike of 400 members of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) ended last night at the Western Pine Manufacturing company. Work was to resume today on \$300,000 worth of defense contracts.

E. S. Jackson, of Seattle, U. S. department of labor conciliator, said the union and the company had agreed on a 52 1/2 cent hourly minimum wage, effective August 15, and also two blanket raises of 23 cents each to be effective June 15 and July 15. The agreement also includes a closed shop and a week's vacation with pay, he said. The union, claiming that minimum wages in the plant were 45 cents an hour, struck a week ago for a 10-cent raise and other concessions.

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RECORD WESTERN TRAVEL FORESEEN

A summer of heavy travel, perhaps the biggest year the west has ever known—that's what western travel experts foresee today. As conservative business men, they refuse to make ironclad predictions but here are the reasons which they believe will put more cars on western highways and more people on western trains, busses and planes, than ever before:

1. Increased national income in all lines of business and industry.
2. Closing of travel to many other countries.
3. Concentration of citizen troops in the west, which will bring their families here to see them during vacation.

Records of Californians, Inc., the All-Year club of Southern California and other civic groups show that travel in the first five months of 1941 was 15 per cent to 25 per cent ahead of 1940. Shell Touring Service reports a big increase in requests for itineraries, with hundreds planning to visit the Pacific northwest and Canada.

"Two important steps for taking care of this big tide of visitors already have been taken in this area," it was stated here today by Shell's local manager, F. W. Hamilton.

"All Shell dealers and stations have been supplied with road maps, travel folders and

local information charts, to help them serve visitors.

"Second, many of these stations again have adopted the 15 specifications set up by a national women's authority as their ideal in maintaining rest rooms. Each station which conforms to these specifications will be allowed to display the nationally known white-cross-of-cleanliness emblem. Tourists, recognizing this emblem, will be more likely to stop in this city because they know the emblem identifies a rest room that's home clean.

"Local station operators are to be commended for their progressiveness in getting ready to make this a banner tourist year."

Final Plans Made For AFL Conclave

ASTORIA, June 6 (P)—Final plans for the AFL State Federation of Labor convention opening here Sunday night were made today by Del Nickerson, executive secretary.

He predicted that the executive board would pass on credentials of nearly 300 delegates, a record attendance. The federation's general assembly will open Monday in the Astoria Central Labor temple.

Figures on maintenance and operations at Randolph Field, Tex., indicate that almost every one of the 300 craft used for student training have flown about 235,000 miles since being turned out from factories.

MERRILL TO GET NEW PHONE BOOKS

MERRILL—New telephone directories will be in the mail within the next few days and patrons of the Columbia Utilities company are asked to burn old copies. The new publication follows the same printed plan as the one published in June, 1940 with the Klamath Falls directory of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company followed by directories of other towns in the Klamath area.

A decided increase in the number of patrons, is indicated with changes in many phone numbers also being listed. All patrons are asked by telephone officials to use the directory and to call for numbers instead of stations.

Some phones installed since

material for the new volume was compiled are not listed, but patrons may call information for unregistered phones. Patrons may also call at the office of the company at Merrill for copies of the directory, additional copies to cost 25 cents in event one is lost or otherwise destroyed.
