SEATTLE, June 6 (AP)—A Greek clarinetist will sponsor a concert here Sunday in memory of an Italian flute player.

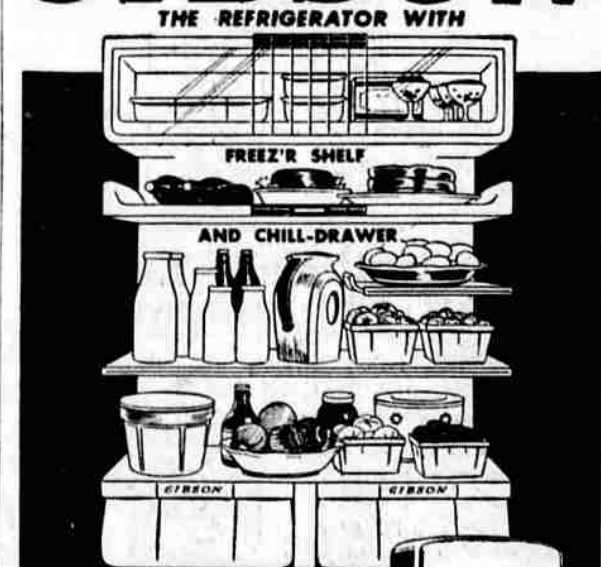
Nicholas Oeconomacos—whose flowing locks and black neckties, Latin quarter black hats and opera cloaks have been familiar sights for many years—gave a concert here 10 years ago in celebration of the independence of his native Greece.

Sunday's concert, in memory of his friend and fellow virtuoso, Glauco Merriggiote, finds Greece captive and overrun by troops from Merriggiote's Italy.

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ROTARY PICKS DELEGATE FOR 'BOYS STATE'

Delbert was introduced at the Friday meeting of Rotary by President Keith K. Ambrose. Yantis was chosen from among Klamath Union high school students. He is a junior this year.

Boys' State is a plan for training in the functional aspects of citizenship. It is a program of education sponsored by the American Legion, department of Oregon, and its purpose is to teach the youth of today constructive attitudes toward the American form of government. Over 20,000 boys attended camps established in 1940, and over 1000 boys to date have attended sessions at the Oregon Boys' State held in Corvallis.

Only boys with outstanding qualifications in character, service and leadership, who will have a serious attitude toward an intensive citizenship training program, are selected to attend Boys' State. Delbert is a member of the Boys' Alliance at KUHS, Boy Scout member of troop 9, has taken an active interest in 4-H club work and hopes to attain leadership of a club next year.
