

AMPLE SUPPLY OF GAS CITED IN LOCAL TALK

No fears of a gas shortage are held by Hugh A. Matler, public relations executive of the Union Oil company, who addressed the Klamath Kiwanis club Thursday noon on the proposed highway from Alaska to the Argentine.

All companies are building new plants and we can "produce gasoline for 50,000 planes," said the oil company man. He told how one well in Kern county, Calif., was drilled to 10,000 feet in 19 days, including casing installation, and said the petroleum industry is geared to meet whatever needs arise.

He told of great supplies of still untapped oil and described unique methods of storing oil underground.

He added that the oil industry can be counted upon for the manufacture of rubber if the rubber supply of the country goes short.

Matler said that highway No. 97, of which The Dalles-California highway is a part, is on the great Alaska-Argentine highway. He showed slides of various parts of this highway in Alaska, North America, Central America and South America, and described it as "the greatest engineering feat in the world."

The importance of the highway in cementing relations of the countries of the western hemisphere was mentioned by the oil company man.

Crossroads Airport Scheme Proposed As Defense Plan

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—A \$20,000,000 cross-roads widening program to provide 400 "satellite airdromes" for mass movements of military aircraft was recommended to congress yesterday by Gen. George H. Brett, army air corps chief.

The recommendation was made to the house roads committee at hearings on President Roosevelt's request for a \$125,000,000 military road program.

These airfields, as outlined by Brett, would be provided by widening concrete highways at crossroads to 250 feet and providing there a 300 foot paralleling graded and grassed strip. The widened highway and the strip would run from 3000 to 5000 feet.

By building the auxiliary fields at cross-roads, planes could land in any one of four wind directions, Brett said.

3000 Coast Guards Man Navy Transports

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—Secretary Morgenthau disclosed today the coast guard was turning over more than 3000 of its sailors over to the navy to man new navy transports.

Morgenthau added that Rear Admiral R. R. Waesche, commandant of the coast guard, believed the men could be spared "without interrupting the regular work of the coast guard."

FRANKFURTERS DE LUXE

Parboil frankfurters and split them in halves lengthwise. Spread the cut sides with mustard and put together again. Wrap each frankfurter with a strip of bacon and skewer in place with toothpicks. Cook in a frying pan until the bacon is crisp and brown.

FRIED TOMATOES WITH CREAM GRAVY

Cut firm tomatoes in thick slices, season them with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Fry in salt pork fat until well browned on both sides. Remove the tomatoes from the pan and keep them hot. If there is a large amount of fat left in the pan, pour off all but about 2 tablespoons. Add 1 1/2 tablespoons of

water, 1 to 1 1/2 cup sugar, pinch salt, 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca. Pit the plums and cut them in pieces before measuring. Add the water and sugar and cook until the plums are soft. Add the tapioca and salt and cook in a double boiler for about 20 minutes or until the tapioca is clear. Stir occasionally.
