Secret Voting on Bills Hit By California Writer

SACRAMENTO, June 6 (UP)—All too often, public officials find it expedient to conduct public business in private sessions, a practice that developed to some extent in the present legislature.

The most flagrant custom was for legislative committees, particularly in the senate, to bar the press and public while voting on a controversial issue, and then balk at revealing how committee members voted. Enough members objected to keep some of the meetings open and made it clear they were not a party to this form of gag rule.

There is no disputing that some situations can be better handled in executive session, such as when a tangled issue needs argument without the interference of lobbyists and partisans, perhaps even the press. But when the voting is done secretly, there ends the defense.

Here was the reaction of Senator John Shelley of San Francisco, one of the chief foes of secret voting:

"I am definitely opposed to executive sessions of legislative committee in the disposition of bills. I have been opposing the practice consistently during the entire session."

"Sometimes an executive session of a committee helps the members to get down to a discussion among themselves on the merits of the issue, which may prove difficult at times in a room crowded with partisans who already have been given a public hearing. But there should be a committee roll call on controversial bills and it should be taken publicly."

"Certain committees, however, go into executive session, discuss a bill and dispose of it, and sometimes even members of the legislature cannot find out exactly what was done with it. Sometimes a bill is tabled and we can't find out by what vote. In some instances the press as well as the public is barred and information on the roll call is not given."

"Disposition of bills in any such fashion as that is a travesty on democracy. Committee action is just as important in the work of the legislature as is the action later on the floor. And the public is entitled to know what goes on in legislative committees."

"A man who is sent here as a legislator is supposed to take his position openly and publicly. If he hasn't the courage to take a position in that fashion in committee, he shouldn't come here. Senator Jesse Mayo, Angels Camp newspaper publisher, added:

Through the newspapers, the people are advised of the functions of the legislators. If the press representatives are barred, it is impossible for the public to obtain an accurate picture of what is going on."

A former newspaperman, Senator Robert Kenny of Los Angeles, commented:

"The citizens of California are entitled to know what their legislative representatives are doing. To bar newspapermen from hearings when measures of importance to the public are be-

ing discussed is certainly improper. It is definitely not in keeping with our democratic processes."

Some committees employ the reasonable expedient of barring the public but admitting the press. And if there is anything transacted which would not be in the public interest to print, the press is willing to cooperate. At the same time, the press constitutes a protection to the public to witness action of the legislators.

Bad government has never flourished where there is a healthy and wide awake press. Many reforms have followed militant newspaper reporting but there still remain certain public officials who believe in their own importance too much for their own good.

The Olson administration had its experience with secret board and committee hearings, but a determined protest from the working press brought orders from the governor that all meetings should be public. There has been little complaint in recent months.

The collapse of the first free conference committee on the biennial budget was a blow to those in the legislature who held hope for adjournment by June 6, the date first selected by the senate. In fact, even the date of June 14 is not too certain and there were plenty of members willing to best the end would not come before the weekend of June 21.

It's the same old story every two years—procrastination and horseplay at the first of the session and overtime work without pay at the end. To persons familiar with efficient business methods, the dilly-dallying of a legislature seems fantastic but it has always been so and probably will continue.

Assembly Overrides Olson's Veto of 'Hot Cargo' Bill

SACRAMENTO, June 6 (AP)—The California assembly voted today after a dramatic, all night session to override Governor Culbert L. Olson's veto of legislation to outlaw labor's "hot cargo" and secondary boycott weapons during the national emergency.

The final vote of 54 to 26—the bare two thirds majority required to override the veto—came at 4 a. m.

Advocated by farm and business organizations, the bill will go into effect 90 days after adjournment of the present legislature unless the assembly agrees to reconsider its action—a possibility considered exceedingly remote. The senate overrode the veto last week, 34 to 5.

A cross-country airplane flight of Assemblywoman Jeanette E. Daley to cast one of the deciding votes, angry charges that parliamentary rules were being disregarded and threats of a referendum move to suspend the legislation—all this and more figured in the hectic session.

The controversial measure makes it unlawful for a person to bring economic pressure on any employer in effort to induce him to refrain from doing business with or handling the products of any other employer because of a dispute between the latter and his employees.

It is written to remain in effect until July 1, 1943, or for the duration of a state of national emergency.

On January 1 of this year, pilot certificates were held by 63,113 individuals in the United States as against 31,264 a year ago, a gain of 101.9 per cent.

Loaded Dice Fatal To Negro Gambler

RAYMONDVILLE, Tex., June 6 (UP)—Loaded dice caused the death of Jimmie Smith, 40-year-old negro.

But it wasn't a gambler's retribution, Smith's wife, Claudia May, 34, told City Marshall G. W. McDougald.

She signed a statement that she poisoned Smith with mercury from his "gallopin dominoes," and murder charges were filed against her. Smith died May 16, complaining of a "ball" in his stomach.
