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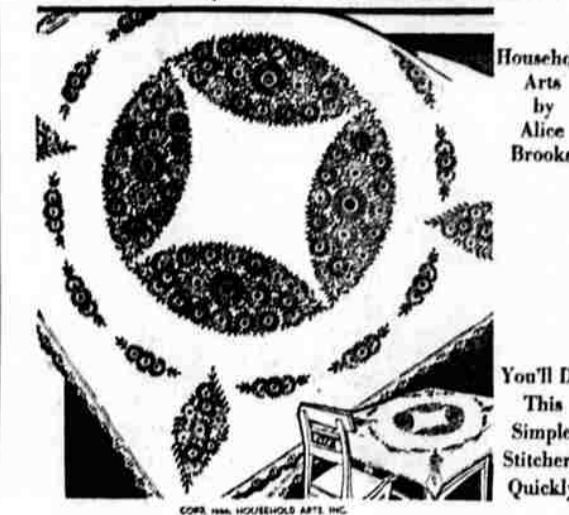

Charged with assault with a dangerous weapon in connection with the knifing of Ivan O'Neill, Shasta Indian, on the night of May 29, Capron L. Ball, 16, member of the Klamath Indian tribe, was transferred from Klamath Falls to Medford Thursday night by Paul Hanlin, United States deputy marshal. Ball was placed in the Jackson county jail pending further action in the case.

According to information received here, Ball is accused of using a knife on O'Neill, inflicting wounds on the chin, and also beating him with a gun to the extent that O'Neill suffered a broken arm and other injuries. O'Neill is now in the county jail charged with possession of liquor. He was arrested on South Sixth street June 5. The charge has nothing to do with the assault case, officers said.
