

TODDLER PACKS ASKED BY RED CROSS OFFICE

Recent requests from abroad have stressed more and more the need for clothing for infants and younger children. American Red Cross layettes provide clothing for the baby up to nine months of age only.

Plans for a special "Toddler Pack" have been worked out by the local chapter and set of garments for the child from nine months to two year of age includes, one sweater, one pair mittens, one "beanie" cap, two pair rompers, one woolen snow suit, two pair woolen undershirts, two sleeping garments, ten diapers.

A plea is made for more workers. Development of more sewing units is urged throughout the city. Units are asked to call local headquarters, 7184, and make arrangements for the use of sewing machines that are furnished for the production room morning and afternoon.

The new location of Red Cross headquarters and work rooms at the armory has provided room for the needed added workers. Two cutting tables are now ready and cutters are asked to volunteer their services for any time during the day. Materials for dresses and layettes have been received and are being cut at this time. Local women are asked to donate any buttons and bits of yarn not being used in the home to the "Toddler Packs" now being made up. In fact, any usable materials will be gladly accepted.

SCOUTS SCORED AT CAMP MEET OVER WEEKEND

Last Saturday and Sunday 125 Boy Scouts from Southern Oregon and Northern California pitched their tents in sight of the historic Parker Mountain stage station. In the early days the station was one of the best known stopping places for travelers from Klamath Falls and the Rogue River valley.

Built by the Parker family, the stopping place was exactly half way between Klamath Falls and Ashland and fast teams could stay there one day out of either town. With the advent of automobiles, however, the station was abandoned, now all that is left are a few shingles, pegs and square nails.

This Camp-O-Ral was between the troops of the Crater Lake Area council and the Modoc Area council. The Camp-O-Ral was divided into two sections. The first dealt strictly with camp and was not competitive. The troops were scored on the way they packed their equipment into the campsite, on the way they made up their camp, their cooking, first aid, and the conditions of the campsite they left.

Proficiency camp awards were won by Troop 4 of Medford, Troop 31 of Weed, Troop 36 of Yreka, and Troop 4 of Klamath Falls. Standard Campers awards were won by Troop 1 of Klamath Falls, Troop 7 of Merrill, Troop 13 of Lakeview, Troop 7 of Medford, Troop 32 of Weed and Troop 38 of Hornbrook. Participating awards were given to Troops 6, 9, and 18 of Klamath Falls.

In the competitive events, Troop 31 of Weed won first place with 72½ points, Troop 7 of Medford won second, with 54½ points, Troop 32 of Weed won third with 53½ points, Troop 1 of Klamath Falls fourth with 39½ points. Troop 38 of Hornbrook fifth with 38 points.

In the bugling contest all three places went to the Crater Lake council. They were: Delmar Kalda, Troop 31; Ernest Norton, Troop 35; Elmer Bashaw, Troop 7.

In the archery all three places were won by scouts of the Modoc Area council, as follows: Rollo England, Troop 6; Bill Burgess, Troop 9; Ellwood Lewis, Troop 6.

Judging the events were H. J. Boyd, P. A. Everett, Hugh Kalfon, of Klamath Falls, and Harold Ogle Sr., of Weyerhaeuser Camp. Also K. A. Wells, scout executive of the Crater Lake council, and D. E. Gilchrist, scout executive of the Modoc Area council.

ADVERTISING PAYS, CLAIMS BREWING HEAD

Does it pay to advertise in the newspapers? "I'll say it does," says Karl F. Schuster, president of Acme Breweries, as he proudly related the results of their largest investment in newspaper advertising.

Acme Beer accounted for 25.54 per cent of all California beer sold by California brewers during the month of April of this year, according to Schuster, marking a new all-time high for this popular western beer. This compares with Acme's figure of 22 per cent of all California beer sold for the entire year of 1940 and comes on top of the biggest first four months in the history of Acme. Total sales for these four months were 5,132,910 gallons, representing a sales gain of 795,250 gallons... an increase of 18.33 per cent over 1940, based on figures released by the California state board of equalization. This sales gain is all the more noteworthy since during these four months the remainder of the California brewing industry showed a sales decline of 2.2 per cent. Acme beer has led in far-western sales ever since repeal and its advertising has been continuously handled by Brischner, Davis and staff.

Asked if the establishment of large army camps had had any effect on Acme sales, Schuster stated that large increases in areas containing army camps were partially offset by smaller than average increases in other districts. "Our conclusion," said Schuster, "is that men in the army are not drinking more beer, but that this consumption has shifted from the cities and towns where these men lived to the camps where they are now in training."

HAYES CENTER, Neb., (AP)—When a rain and hail storm flattened his wheat and killed 70 hogs, Farmer Reed Loomis decided to rush into town and tell his insurance company.

Topping a steep hill, he saw too late that a bridge approach in the canyon below had been washed out. Realizing it would be futile to try to stop, he stepped on the gas and leaped the washed out gap some 12 feet. He made it safely, but the machine's rear wheels were wrecked.

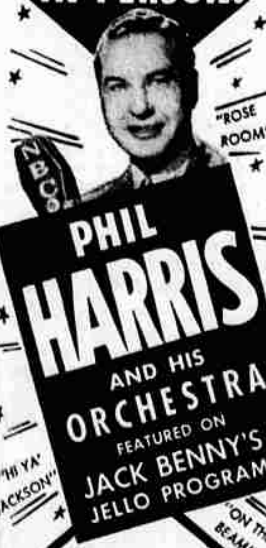
