actual cost of the weapons of war. Some were approximations of value after depreciation, obsolescence and deterioration were taken into account.

Rising Steadily And while the total was relatively small, Mr. Roosevelt noted that exports of war goods to Britain had risen steadily since September 1939, when European nations began their conflict.

His report itself covered shipments for the period from March 11 to May 31, but in the first five months of this year, the president said, Britain was sent 12 times as many planes and 10 times as many aircraft engines as in the first five months of 1940.

"Relatively more and more heavy bombers and medium bombers are being sent," he said.

for bomber engines now made in this country.

Martin made his announcement as the Alcoa strikers met to act on the settlement terms announced last night by the national defense mediation board.

Lieut. Col. Charles W. Steinmetz of the army staff directing operations at North American said 6950 men were at work out of a normal staff of 7000, and that this was a complete force "allowing for normal absences for sickness, leave and the like."

At a park near the big aviation plant some 600 persons attended a mass meeting called by the CIO United Automobile workers, whose strike for higher wages and a union shop was broken when the army occupied the plant, to protest reports of union discrimination.

The CIO steel workers organizing committee at Pittsburgh asked a 10-cent-an-hour wage increase at two Curtiss-Wright propeller division plants, or an agreement by the company for arbitration. It set midnight tomorrow as the strike deadline.

## Woman Commits Suicide Near Pelican City

Mrs. Mary L. Schaffer, 37, apparently took her own life with a 30-70 rifle late Tuesday night, according to Sheriff Lloyd Low, who investigated the scene at the Schaffer home near Pelican City.

Low said Mrs. Schaffer was found dead in the cab of a truck owned by her husband, Jess Schaffer, who operates a mink farm half a mile toward Klamath Falls from Pelican City, after neighbors heard a rifle shot.

The body was slumped in the seat and a 30-30 rifle nearby indicated to authorities that the woman had committed suicide.

Sheriff Low said Mrs. Schaffer left a note.

Surviving are her husband and two daughters, Faye, 11, and Jean, 15. The body is at Ward's.

# Home Towns Come First In Democracy, Declares Editor

Democracy begins at home, and those who believe in and would perpetuate democracy should give their efforts to solution of the problems that confront their own communities.

Such was the theme of the principal address at the annual meeting of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, delivered to a large dinner audience last night by William Tugman, managing editor of the Eugene Register-Guard.

He discussed the functions of an effective chamber of commerce in solving community problems and bringing community projects to successful conclusion. As each unit of the nation makes democracy work, he pointed out, so will the nation prove itself strong and enduring.

Touching on broader aspects of the current situation, the Eugene editor declared: "I don't think the U. S. needs to be led by deception, because we are not a race of cowards. We are ready to face the facts."

"Right is right and we are not safe in a world where wrong is tolerated." In the past, the prominent valley journalist declared, the United States has erred on the side of weakness. From now on, he said, it must err on the side of firmness in dealing with the national and international problems that confront it.

In reference to strikes, Tugman recalled situations that existed just prior to U. S. entry and during its part in the world war.

"From all indications," he said, "Germany has gotten smarter. It has learned that instigators are more effective than dynamite."

To determine which are just and honest strikes, and which are disturbances fomented by influences unfriendly to the welfare of the nation, is a serious problem, the speaker pointed out.

Lee Jacobs presided at the after-dinner program at the Willard hotel dining room. H. P. Bosworth, Jr., retiring president of the chamber, related accomplishments of the past year, laying stress on progress that has been made on the Tule lake sump project.

Godfrey Blohm, the incoming president, outlined the probable work of the chamber in the year ahead, emphasizing national defense.

Vice President William Ganning and Treasurer George Myers were introduced, and Earl C. Reynolds, chamber secretary, introduced guests from Rogue valley, Klamath and Lake county chambers. The main speaker of the evening was introduced by Malcolm Epley, managing editor of the Herald and News.

Musical numbers were provided by Dorothy Stevens Kuykendall, vocalist; the Laurensen trio, featuring piano, violin and xylophone; and the Mitchell brothers of Merrill.
