Over Two Million Tons of Shipping Sunk, Says Berlin

BERLIN, June 11 (AP)—The German navy and air force sank a total of 2,235,000 tons of British ships or ships carrying goods to Britain during the first four months of 1941, the high command declared today in a report summarizing military operations for that period.

To the navy was credited 1,471,000 tons—978,000 tons by submarines and 493,000 by surface ships—and to the air force 170 ships totaling 764,000 tons

In addition, some 1,200,000 tons of shipping in British use was reported damaged.

To these totals must be added British losses by mines and valuable prizes brought into ports under German domination, the high command said. Figures on these losses were not given.

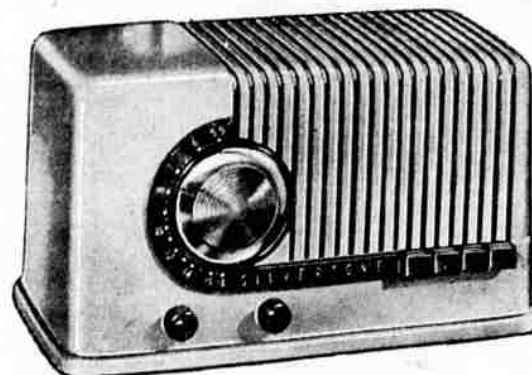
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
