

GROUP NAMED BY RED CROSS FOR ROLL CALL

Frederick Hamilton was again chosen chairman for the annual membership enrollment at a luncheon meeting of the pre-roll call committee, Klamath county chapter, American Red Cross, Monday. Orin Slemore was appointed assistant chairman.

The need for increased enrollment was stressed by Mrs. Boyd due to the fact that national defense plans call for expansion of all branches of military service, including soldiers, sailors, marines, air corps, coast guardsmen and their families.

"The American Red Cross is a quasi-government organization chartered to act in matters of voluntary relief and in accord with the military and naval authorities as a medium of communication between the people of the United States of America and their army and navy," said Mrs. Boyd. Families of enlisted men are invited to use the services which the local chapter American Red Cross extend. Headquarters are now located in the armory, 112 North Spring street, and all visitors are welcome.

At Monday's meeting recognition was given to Leslie Rogers, treasurer, Klamath county chapter, American Red Cross. George Walton, former executive secretary, presented Rogers with a gold Red Cross lapel pin on behalf of the local chapter and stated that Rogers was the oldest active member of the group. He was elected treasurer of the local organization on July 9, 1918, although he had been active prior to that time.

A monthly financial report of the chapter has been sent by Rogers to the national office during the past 24 years. Rogers minimized his part in the work of the organization by saying, "One can only do a little bit as they go through this life."

PORTLAND, Ore., June 11 (AP)—The Columbia river basin's 5000 CIO loggers will vote next week on a contract negotiated through the federal mediation board.

Al Hartung, CIO logger president for the area, said the ballots would be tabulated by June 21.

The union's negotiating committee has recommended the contract which calls for a 74-cent-an-hour wage increase to 75 cents, a week's paid vacation and modified union shop clause.
