SCHOOL VOTE ELECTS BUELL AT TULELAKE

TULELAKE—In the heaviest school vote ever polled here, Cecil Buell was elected last weekend to the board of directors of the Tulelake joint elementary school, defeating Charles K. Wiese by only 5 votes.

Buell was elected for a three year term to succeed Mrs. Frank Bell, clerk of the board who did not run for reelection. Fred E. McMurphy and Karl Gentry, incumbents whose names were placed on the ballot by popular request polled heavy votes for the one and two year terms. Mrs. Frances Hannon was a write-in candidate.

Mrs. Roy Campbell served on the election board as inspector and the judges were Mrs. Dan Geaney and Mrs. Bothwell.

On the Siskiyou Union high school ballot A. R. Kindig and William G. Hagelstein, incumbents were reelected.

In the Winema district Lee Dixon was elected to succeed John Kandra Jr., retiring member of the board, and in the

Carr district W. G. McClymonds, incumbent, only candidate to file, succeeds himself.

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CEMENT FORMS FOR TULE LAKE TUNNEL READY

TULELAKE — Forms to be used for concrete in the Tule lake reclamation drainage tunnel have been completed at the west portal of the bore and went into place last weekend in preparation for operations when crushed rock and other necessary materials are ready.

The timber forms, built in halves and joined by a timber key are horseshoe shape, covered with 20 gauge sheet iron. Each of the 31 sections were 16 feet long and were placed end to end in the tunnel. Cement will be blown over and around the units for a distance of between 500 and 600 feet before they are moved.

Both portals will be reinforced for a distance of 21 feet inside the bore with steel.

The west portal opens into the canal now being completed which will be known as the "P" canal, running through the desert for a distance of three-quarters of a mile before branching, one branch running south for two miles and the second north for 10 miles. The branches will carry water to grazing lands and to the wild fowl refuge also now under construction.
