KALPINE-AFL BARGAINING PACT SIGNED

A collective bargaining agreement between the Kalpine Plywood company and Local 2922 of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (AFL) was signed Thursday afternoon, ending a three-month inter-union labor squabble which resulted in two strikes at the Weed highway plant.

Approved by both Don Drury, Kalpine manager, and officials of Local 2922, the agreement calls for recognition of the AFL as sole bargaining agent, provides for a union shop and strict seniority and sets up machinery for arbitration of all disputes.

Final approval climaxed a wild series of incidents beginning with a CIO strike for recognition on March 4 which closed the plant for four weeks. On April 1, some 40 men of over 75 strikers, most of whom were said to be members of the AFL, walked through the CIO picket lines and resumed work following an AFL majority claim.

The company, however, shortly thereafter offered to recognize the CIO as sole bargaining agent "until legal means prove otherwise." Sporadic negotiations followed.

On April 22, pickets were withdrawn from the plywood mill and the CIO called off the strike. Later the AFL waged a successful two-hour strike which resulted in its being recognized as bargaining agent by the firm.

Negotiations resulting in the signed contract were then begun. Following are the contract points:

1. The company agrees to recognize the AFL as sole bargaining agent for workers.
2. The company retains the right to promote, demote, hire or fire any worker but agrees to meet with a plant committee pending such a move.
3. Promotion will be on a basis of strict seniority subject to qualification and competence of men involved.
4. The principle of union shop

will be recognized. Any worker with the firm for more than 30 days must join the AFL.

5. Both parties agree to a voluntary submission of all disputes to arbitration and agree to a compulsory acceptance of arbitrators' findings.

Penitentiary Guard Shot in 1925 Riot Dies After Fall

SALEM, June 12 (AP)—Lute Savage, 77, the Oregon penitentiary guard who survived a shot under the heart in the famous Kelly-Willos-Murray break in 1925, died in a hospital here last night from injuries received in a fall.

In the 1925 break, Bert "Oregon" Jones, a prisoner, and two guards were killed. Tom Murray, who shot Savage, Elsworth Kelly and James Willos escaped, but were recaptured. Kelly and Willos were then hanged, and Murray hanged himself in his cell.

The 1941 legislature gave Savage a pension.

The girl left a note in lipstick with the cryptic message, "Diving, Monroe," and her purse on the rail. A driver's license in

The body was recovered 10 minutes after she jumped a half mile below the span. She was apparently about 18 years old. The license gave her address as 4045 First, San Diego.

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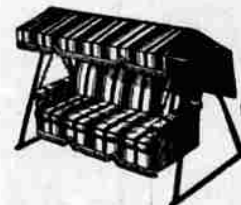
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
