## PILOT COURSE OFFERED ARMY ENLISTED MEN

High school graduates in the regular army and those planning on enlisting for the regular army air corps in the near future, will be cheered by the news released by Lt. Col. B. H. Hensley, district army recruiting officer for the state of Oregon, that the new bill recently passed by congress for enlisted pilot training, has just been signed by the president.

The new bill authorizes the secretary of war to detail enlisted men in the army for training and instruction as aviation students, with pay and other allowances of their respective grades while learning. When they have won their "wings," they will fly as non-commissioned officers and these aviation students will be issued \$10,000 in government life insurance, in premium to be paid by the government while they are learning and by themselves afterwards. While all of the manifold details of selecting, training and using these enlisted pilots have not been worked out, these are some of the probabilities: applicants will be enlisted in the regular army for a three-year enlistment term and those between the ages of 19 and 22 will be given preference. The physical standard required of all student pilots will not be lowered, it will be the same as that for flying cadets. Graduates of accredited secondary schools who have credits for at least 13 credits of mathematics will be accepted for training without examination.

A plan is being considered whereby on completion of training as a student pilot the enlisted man would be appointed as a flight sergeant, third class, ranking as a staff sergeant in the army with pay of \$108 per month while on flight duty. After completing a three-year enlistment he would be appointed flight sergeant, second class, ranking as a technical sergeant of the

regular army with pay of \$126 per month. Upon his third three-year enlistment, he would be appointed to flight sergeant, first class, and rank as a master sergeant with pay of \$207.90 per month.

After nine years service, flight sergeants, first class, would be eligible to participate in a competitive examination for appointment as warrant officers, junior grade. All enlisted pilots would be entitled to clothing, subsistence, and rental allowances normal for their grade in the army.

Under the new "enlisted pilots training" bill, men who formerly were ineligible for pilots training in the air corps because they lacked the requisite two years of college will be afforded an opportunity to win "wings" under the same general system of training as that now in effect for flying cadets.

Colonel Hensley stated that enlistments for this new pilots training would begin immediately upon receipt of the "go" signal from Washington. It is anticipated about July 10th. Of course the enlisted men already in the service will be given first choice for this training. He urged all young men who feel they have the necessary qualifications, to make application for the regular army air corps as soon as possible so they will be in the service at the time the pilots training starts. Your application will be accepted at the local army recruiting office, room 219, Postoffice building, Klamath Falls, Ore.

### McNary Observes 67th Birthday in Senate Chamber

WASHINGTON, June 12 (P)—There was a "business as usual" air at the first desk in the first row of the minority side of the senate chamber today, despite the fact that it was the sixty-seventh birthday of its occupant—Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon, the republican leader.

## 3186 INCOME RETURNS FOR COUNTY IN '39

WASHINGTON, June 12 (P)—The number of individual income tax returns filed for 1939 totaled 7,648,682, or 1,399,590 more than the 6,249,093 returns filed for 1938.

These figures were made public today by Guy T. Helvering, internal revenue commissioner, in a bulletin showing the number of individual income tax returns for 1939, filed through December 31, 1940, by states, counties, cities and towns having a population of 1000 and over.

Total returns filed for the states and territories included: Idaho 17,116; Oregon 67,034; Washington 127,259.
