Bishop Names 13 Men For Medford Contest

Virgil Gross, Ex-Whitman Catcher, Signed; Crapo Drops in Averages

Manager Ernie Bishop of the Pelican Baseball club Friday announced to take a 13-man squad to Medford Saturday afternoon to tackle the potentially strong Craters on their home diamond in two games, one an exhibition affair scheduled for 8:30 p. m. Saturday evening and the other a State league encounter billed for 2 p. m. Sunday afternoon.

Riding on the crest of a four-game streak that includes wins over Toledo and Eugene in State league competition and Dorris of the Northern California circuit, the Pelicans will be gunning for a double victory over the Craters this weekend. Especially predominant in the minds of the locals, however, will be to score a triumph in the State loop tilt Sunday.

Five infielders, Regulars Paul Crapo, Ernie Bishop, Jack Lloyd and Babe Schwab, and Utility Don Jones, will be on the traveling squad this week. Pitchers Orin Davis, Bill Hanauksa and Clyde Carlstrom will form the mound corps with the latter probably being used for relief duty only.

A worthy addition to the catching staff apparently has been assured, according to Pelican Scout Pete Lesmeister who Thursday stated that he had secured the services of Virgil Gross, first-string receiver of the Northwest Conference Championship Whitman College Missionaries. Gross is expected to add power to Klamath offense since he is considered a capable hitter. Warren Wahner, who has caught every game for the Pelicans since he joined up early in the season, now probably will be used occasionally in the outfield where he has had some experience.

Five outfielders, Big Norm Peters, the Oregon State college football and baseball star who hit three for eight and drove in four runs last week against Eugene, Paul Bernadou, Anthol Riney, Mickey Davis and Marshall Eyston are slated for action this week against the Medfordites.

Manager Bishop pulled ahead of First Baseman Paul Crapo in State league batting averages over the last weekend when he clouted two hits in five at-tempts. Crapo dropped 54

points to .400 by getting only one for four last Sunday. Bishop fell off five points from his .417 mark of last week.

Shortstop Jack Lloyd banged out two for five to take over third place among the locals with a .333 average. Third Baseman Babe Schwab collected one for three to advance from .300 to .308 for the season to date.

Berg Faces Jameson in Semi-Finals

CINCINNATI, June 13 (AP)—That old "Friday the 13th" jinx doesn't mean a thing to the four semi-finalists in the 12th annual Women's Western open golf championship. Anything that occurs probably will seem anticlimactic when compared with yesterday's quarter final activities in the lower bracket.

The upper half of the draw rolled along as expected, with Patty Berg, the Minneapolis professional and former amateur champion, winning a semi-final berth opposite Betty Jameson, the two-time national amateur queen from old San Antonio.

But in the other match, where the galleries had expected Helen Dettweiler, the Washington professional and winner of the open in 1939, to meet Mary Agnes Wall, the star from Menominee, Mich., two newcomers to big time golf were found.

They are Mrs. James D. Platt Jr., of Dayton, the Ohio medal play champion, who tackled a convincing 7 and 6 defeat on Miss Dettweiler, and Mrs. Burt Weil of Cincinnati, a three-time winner of the Ohio championship, who ushered Miss Wall to the sidelines, one down.

Schley Nurse, guided by consistent little Roy Smith, was third.

Holder of the only quiniela ticket on the Sir Maxim-Salmore combination was reported to be Mrs. Lou Serruys, winner of Wednesday night's \$97.20 payoff.

Pari-mutuel windows reported a larger play during last night's seven race program than recorded on Wednesday night's inaugural card of the eight-day Jockey club's start meeting.

A slight injury to Grant Zuffelt, up on Mr. Flag in the five-furlong first race, marred the second night running. The young Revere River, Utah, jockey suffered a badly bruised left leg when the Johnson entry hit the rail. Zuffelt was thrown Wednesday night and put a deep gash in his right knee.
