TULELAKE AWAITS SEWER APPROVAL

TULELAKE—Approval of the city council on property assessments is the last legal angle to be settled before formal acceptance of the city's newly completed sewer system which was verbally approved this week by Edward K. Hussey, Oakland, city engineer and other technicians who checked on the disposal unit, the chlorination system and mains. "A superb job" was the comment of the engineer and others who understand the intricacies of a disposal system.

Assessment apportionments are expected to be approved at next week's council session and hook-ups on the system can be made in the next week or 10 days. Clifford A. Dunn, Klamath Falls, was in charge of the work.

The city, at its last council session, renewed the lease to the department of motor vehicles which has its local office in the city hall.

The council also accepted an invitation extended by the city fire department to be present for the banquet to be put on June 18 by members of the volunteer fire department. The invitation was extended by Al Porter.
