

Talbot Predicts Bomber Will Knock Out Conn in Third Round

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—Joe Louis will knock out Billy Conn in about three rounds next Wednesday night at the Polo grounds. If it goes longer than that, Billy will be just plain lucky.

This is said after a personal tour of inspection of the champion's training camp at Greenwood lake, just up the Hudson, where the large negro is getting ready to defend his championship.

There has been considerable talk about Louis being worn out by his strenuous campaign of the past spring, during which he has fought more often than necessary. It has been said and be-

lieved that Joe has turned into an old man.

There is nothing to it, folks. This Joe Louis still is the greatest fighting man you or I will see in a lifetime. He has taken them all on, one after the other, and it is your argument against mine when you say Jack Dempsey or Gene Tunney could have whipped him.

There is nothing Joe Louis lacks to make him a great fighter. Yesterday I saw that he was a much finer boxer than Billy Conn. Against four sparring partners, who were doing their poor best to emulate Conn, he picked off their punches with his right glove, a flick at a time, and then tore them to shreds.

Joe's trainer, old Jack Blackburn, twice had to call time prematurely to keep him from knocking a couple of sparring partners silly.

What makes it worse for Conn, a mere light-heavyweight trying to fight a big man, is that Louis is not feeling friendly about this fight. Joe reads the papers, and he has noted that Conn repeatedly has referred to him as a "dumb negro" and an "old man." While Louis realizes that a "ghost writer" has been responsible for these remarks, he still feels that Conn has condoned them, and he is sore about it. He intends to knock Billy on his head—quickly.

LONG CREEK for bait fishing with some spinners working.

FISH LAKE as usual on worms as bait.

EAST LAKE. Some fish being caught on trolls. Most fish on bait.

PAULINA LAKE. Deep trolling with flashers and worms or trout-orenos. Some fly fishing.

ELK LAKE. Bait and fly fishing. Fish running over 14 inches.

FOUR-MILE LAKE. Most anything will do. Fishing good.

HARRIET LAKE. If you need the exercise, try it on bait and spinners. You'll be surprised.

ODELL LAKE. Good trolling very deep. Some Mackinaw being taken.

CRESCENT LAKE. Mostly trolling. Fish running large and average about three per fisherman so far.

DESCHUTES RIVER. Good on flies in almost all sections. Some spinner fishing and bait with single eggs. A good bet.

The old reliable, the friend in need, the old standby—UPPER KLAMATH LAKE—seems to be the No. 1 spot as a sure-fire fish-getting spot.

Both Harriman lodge and Rocky Point lodge report good fishing all week on trolling. Some of the fish caught were 8 pounds and better. Trolling wobblers is most popular with some boats anchoring near the various creek mouths.

CORVALLIS, June 13 (Special)—The Four-H summer school here this year is expected to be one of the biggest and best in the history of the event.

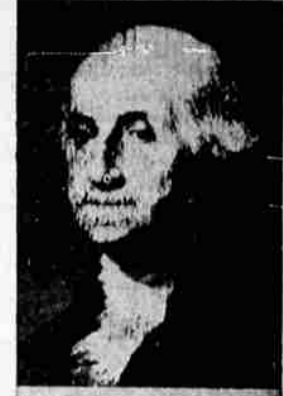
Approximately 2000 4-H club boys and girls arrived Monday and have taken living quarters in the dormitories, fraternities and sororities of Oregon State college.

Rigney Will Accept Regular Draft Turn

White Sox Hurler Withdraws Request for Induction Postponement

CHICAGO, June 13 (AP)—Pitcher Johnny Rigney has decided to take his regular turn in the army draft after all.

The 26-year-old Chicago White Sox hurler said last night he had been ill advised in asking a stay, that he had withdrawn his request (granted by his local draft board but appealed to Washington by the Illinois selective service director) and that he would report for induction June 20 as originally scheduled.

In a statement issued at last night's White Sox-New York Yankee game, Rigney said: "My recent request for postponement of induction into the army was based solely and entirely upon a letter written by a high-ranking official of the national selective service in which the advice was contained that ball players were entitled to ask for a 60-day delay if called during the regular season. . . .

"I did act upon it, with the assurance that my act was both reasonable and in accordance with the strict interpretation of the act. I have since learned that this letter and its interpretation of the draft code are in controversy and, therefore, I have asked permission to withdraw my recent request and I am ready to go June 20th."

In asking deferment, Rigney had said his induction would cost him four-elevenths of his \$12,000 salary and work an "unusual individual hardship" on him.

State Amateur Golfers Meet In Finals

PORTLAND, June 13 (AP)—Finalists will emerge in the Oregon state amateur golf tournament today at the Oswego Lake Country club course. Top-heavy favorites were Alan Mills and Lou Jennings.

Mills, the San Franciscan who shot low medal score Wednesday, clipped two strokes from par on the out nine yesterday to trim Jack Shuler, Portland, 4 and 3.

Two easy victories were scored in women's play yesterday, Sissie Green defeating Mrs. Martin Hunter, 6 and 5, and Margaret Crosbie routing Mrs. Don McBride, 7 and 5. Babe Freeze beat Helen Roblin of Hood River, 2 up, and Mrs. Omar Anderson took a 3 and 1 victory from Mrs. Mac Wilkins. All winners are from Portland.

Coast Grid Heads See Confab End

SEATTLE, June 13 (AP)—This is Friday the 13th, and it may be viewed in the future as an unlucky day for any Pacific Coast conference school found guilty of violating provisions of the Atherton "purity code."

Conference faculty representatives hoped to conclude their five-day session by noon today, and it was understood that one of the items on their program would be a vote on whether to assess fines on schools involved in proselyting of athletes.

Conference Commissioner Edwin Atherton, in predicting action on the proposal to levy fines, did not specify any amounts.

The faculty men went over all recommendations dealing with recruiting yesterday and last night and will incorporate their findings in a recodified conference rule book. Examples of each type of recruiting violation will be given, and some sources indicated the size of fine for the particular infraction might be given.

Berlin Cautions Residents Against New British Bombs

BERLIN, June 13 (AP)—The Berlin district air defense command advised the capital's inhabitants today to go to air raid protection cellars immediately when sirens sound because "the enemy's new-type weapon has a severe effect."

The warning noted that many persons go to cellars only when anti-aircraft artillery goes into action with the result "that there have been a great number of bomb victims."

Experience, it said, shows that rooms below ground are safest during an air raid.
