## CHOIR TO APPEAR WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Due to the lack of room in the Immanuel Baptist church, the First Presbyterian church has come to our rescue and have opened their doors to accommodate the crowds to hear the famous choir from the Hinson Memorial Baptist church of Portland, scheduled here Wednesday evening, June 18. The concert will consist of some interesting singing in a cappella chorus, by the choir of 27 voices, featuring the compositions of Dr. Melius Christensen, the inimitable conductor-composer of the famous St. Olaf college, of Northfield, Minnesota.

Each year this famous church choir makes a tour in behalf of good music. This is the fourth annual concert tour. Last year when the choir sang in Spokane, the Spokane Spokesman Review said, "To hear this non-professional group sing only the first strains of its opening selections is to understand why its annual Easter program has become so popular that Portland's huge municipal auditorium is needed to accommodate the throngs which come to hear it." As all are aware each Easter the congregation of the Hinson Memorial Baptist church of Portland overflows the walls of their large church auditorium and hold their annual celebration of that holy event in the Portland municipal auditorium. At this time the united choirs of 165 voices of the church take their place in front of the auditorium in the shape of a cross, and their multi-colored vestments is considered one of the most beautiful Easter settings on the entire Pacific coast.

Lauren B. Sykes, director of the Hinson Memorial Baptist church choir will furnish a group of interesting organ solos featuring the concert theme and variations by Joseph Bonnet, the internationally famous French organist-composer. Sykes is an associate in the American Guild of Organists and was for two years dean of the organ chapter in American composers, and served for several seasons as president of the Society of Oregon Composers, a state-wide organization. As director of the choir in the Hinson Memorial Baptist church he conducts six junior and senior choirs, with a total of 165 voices.

Last year when the choir sang in Victoria, B. C., Dr. Percy C. Hull, organist of Hereford Cathedral, England said in a recent communication, "We still have pleasant recollections of the very fine evening of music given by you (Mr. Sykes) and your keen and enthusiastic choir in Victoria and the splendid, artistic results achieved." The Daily Colonist of Victoria stated, "The choir's tone was fresh, exuberant, bright in quality and true in pitch. The director showed splendid control of his ensemble, commanding crisp attack, clean phrasing, and effective variety of tonal values." The choir of 27 selected voices will sing its program entirely by memory with accompaniment and a cappella. The program will begin promptly at 8 o'clock and the public is cordially invited to attend. There is no admission charge, but there will be an offering.

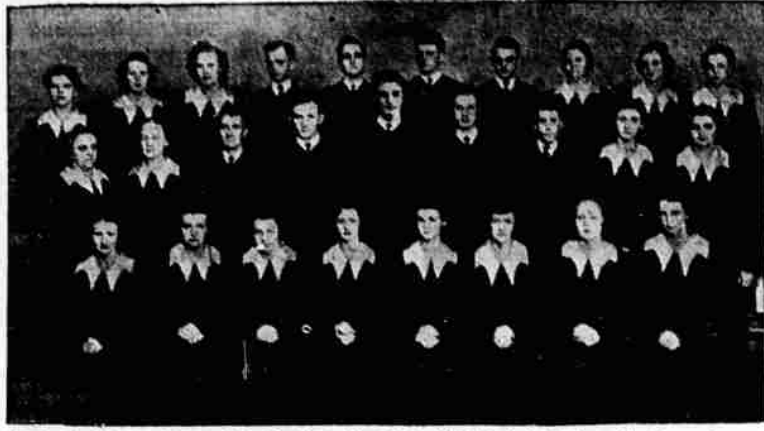

### HER RECIPE

**FOOD FOR THE GODS**

8 eggs  
2 c. White Satin Sugar  
1 c. finely chopped pitted dates  
1 c. Josephine County walnuts, chopped

8 rounding tablespoons of Sunkist rolled cracker crumbs  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1 pinch of salt

Combine as follows: Yolks of eggs beaten until very light. Then add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add dates and walnuts, and cracker crumbs mixed with baking powder. Lastly, add the stiffly whipped whites of eggs to which there has been added a pinch of salt.

Bake in a well-buttered pudding dish, placed in a pan of hot water. It will require about 1 1/2 hrs. to bake; not to be overdone, but just "set" nicely. Moderate oven. Serve with whipped cream.
