RALLY WANES AS CUSTOMERS CASH STOCKS

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—Rallying vitality waned in the stock market today as customers with comfortable profits on the lengthy bulge took home a little cash as insurance against weekend happenings.

While recently strong movers dropped 1 to 2 or more points at the worst, the majority of losses were in fractions. Most rails limited minus signs to small amounts. Utilities, oils, rubbers and aircrafts contested selling. Steels and motors were backward.

Transfers were around 480,000 shares. Lightening of commitments was attributed to the thought the market was entitled to a "corrective reaction" because it had recovered more than two points on average since the first of the month. At the same time, Wall street still was optimistic for business and hopeful over the administration's attitude toward defense strikes. Scant stimulation was discovered in the war news.

Among stocks Western Union and Postal Telegraph preferred posted new highs for the year, reviving conjectures as to the chances of a merger of communications systems being approved by Washington. Standard Oil (N. J.), Phillips Petroleum and Armour preferred also got into new high ground for 1941.

On the losing end the greater part of the day were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Westinghouse, DuPont, J. I. Case, Consolidated Aircraft, Anaconda and American Smelting.

Bonds were irregularly in arrears.

WHEAT RECOVERS AFTER LOW POINT

CHICAGO, June 13 (AP)—After dipping about a cent to the lowest levels in a week, wheat prices today rallied sharply, scoring net overnight gains of more than a cent in the final hour.

Part of the upturn in wheat was associated with gains of more than 3 cents in soybeans following announcement that the government will support beans at around \$1 a bushel. The government, however, did not disclose how prices would be supported but the announcement said the purpose was to increase production of beans for oil. Bean futures sold up to near \$1.40.

Reports of high moisture test wheat being harvested in Oklahoma and of reduced Kansas crop estimates were bullish factors.

Wheat closed 1 1/2c higher than yesterday, July \$1.02-1.02 1/2, September \$1.03 1/2; corn 1/4c higher; July 73 1/2c, September 75 1/2c; oats unchanged to 1c higher; soybeans 2 1/2c higher.

WOOL MARKET
BOSTON, June 13 (AP-USA)—Worsted types of greasy shorn domestic wools were slow today but some houses were receiving a fair demand for woolen types of domestic wools. A few sales were of fair volume on eight months Texas wools, pulled domestic wools and a few types of scoured foreign wools. Short to good French combing fine territory original wools quoted at \$1 to \$1.03, scoured basis, were very slow. Average bright combing three-eighths and one-quarter blood fleeces wools were quiet and quotations were showing some softness as an occasional carload was available at prices slightly under the range 46 to 47 cents, in the grease.

Pine Production Takes Sharp Jump

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Western pine lumber production and shipments were up sharply during the week ending June 7 but the order file was a trifle thinner, the Western Pine association said today.

Production for the week was 86,918,000 board feet compared with 77,518,000 for the previous week and 78,487,000 for the same week of 1940. Shipment figures in that order: 81,260,000 board feet, 76,800,000 and 77,214,000; orders: 84,112,000 feet, 86,008,000 and 72,825,000.

Milk Price Boost Seen for Portland

PORTLAND, June 13 (AP)—A milk price increase appeared certain here today after the state milk control board turned down a plea for deferment of price adjustments.

An increase of a cent a quart was advocated at a recent hearing. J. H. Mapes, administrator, said the board would make recommendations today.

Housewives Unite to Urge Extra Fish Day Each Week

Fish twice a week—that's the new defense slogan for American housewives who keep their protein standards high and their food costs low.

All over the country women's groups are urging their local fish dealers to make Tuesday a bargain fish day as well as Friday. William Fellows Morgan, Jr., Commissioner of Markets in New York City, started the Tuesday bargain fish day. He reports marked success.

Here are a few rules for successful fish cookery:

TO BAKE FISH—WHOLE AND STUFFED
 Head and tail may be left on. Wash, rub with salt inside and out. Stuff with a savory bread crumb stuffing, and sew the opening. Brush with melted butter, or place strips of bacon or salt pork on top. Place on a greased shallow pan or oven-proof platter. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until browned, basting occasionally with drippings. A fish weighing 3 pounds will take 35-40 minutes and a 5-pound fish, 50 to 60 minutes.

TO BAKE FILLETS
 Two fillets may be put together with a well-seasoned stuffing. Keep in place with skewers or toothpicks, brush with butter and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 30-35 minutes, basting frequently.

TO BAKE FISH WITH SAUCE
 A fish may be split or filleted and covered with any suitable sauce, topped with buttered bread crumbs and baked in a moderate oven (325-350 degrees F.) for about half an hour. Fil-
