(London reports have indicated that the allied drive on Damascus had been held up pending negotiations for a bloodless march into the capital.

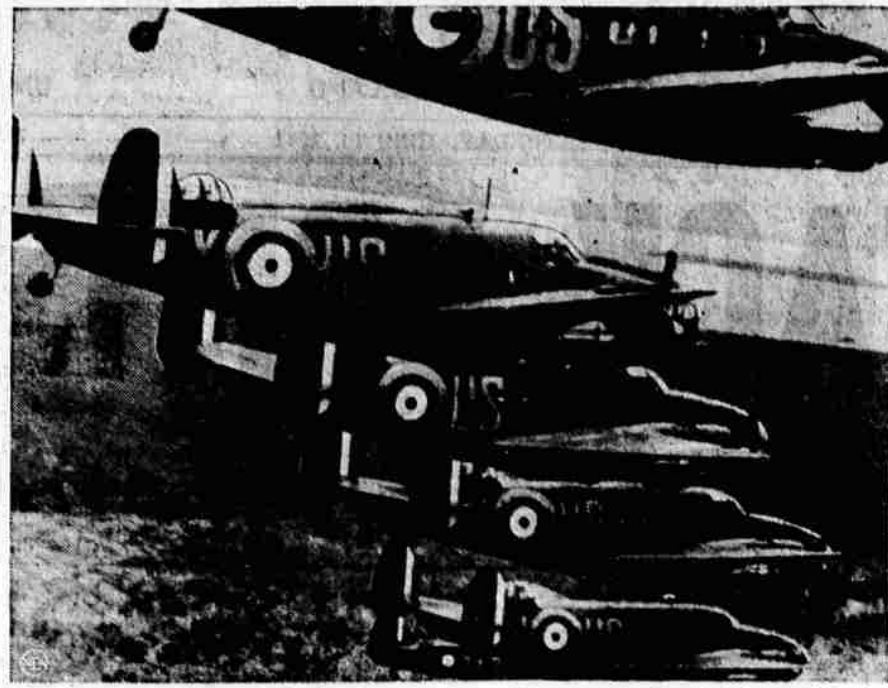
Lawrence Priest Sr., mechanic, was detailed to do the work of dismantling the steering mechanism and apparently Lundeborg was satisfied with his work.

HULL ATTACKS DARLAN, LAVAL

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull Friday charged "the Laval-Darlan element" of France with selling out to Adolf Hitler in a scheme to bring about the downfall of Great Britain and give Germany control of the high seas.

"In the prevention of such a possibility," Hull said in a statement to the press, "both the French people and the people of the United States have a common interest of tremendous importance to the future."

The state department said the broadside—the third directed at the French Vichy government by Hull and President Roosevelt in less than a month—was issued in response to press inquiries as to the status of relations between the Vichy and U. S. governments.

Hull specifically denounced Pierre Laval, vice premier ousted from Premier Marshal Henri Philippe Petain's cabinet, and the present vice premier, Admiral Jean Francois Darlan. He accused them of using France to fight Germany's battles in Syria and leading the French people to surrender their loyalties to Hitler.

He refrained from naming the aged Petain as a member of the "Laval-Darlan" clique or as co-author of "the original scheme of the Darlan-Laval group to deliver France politically, economically, socially and militarily to Hitler."

In a previous statement, issued on June 5, which aroused the ire of French Ambassador Gaston Henry-Haye, Hull stated that any Franco-German collaboration which makes France an instrument of "aggression and oppression" will have grave repercussions in this country.

Earlier President Roosevelt had appealed to the French people over the heads of their leaders to resist a Franco-German rapprochement and, in effect, rise against those who were trying to sell France's birthright to the German reich.

Hull's blast tonight was couched in similar vein. He said "it remains to be seen whether the French people accept this preposterous status and thus pave the way for them to find themselves assisting Hitler as his co-belligerents in his desperate effort to conquer Great Britain and secure control of the high seas."

Times May Become Critical Following Boom, Speaker Says

EUGENE, June 14 (AP)—The United States' unemployment problem may become critical after the present construction boom ends, E. J. Griffith, Oregon WPA administrator, warned yesterday.

He advocated putting all the nation's 7,000,000 to 9,000,000 unemployed to work on cantonment and factory building to offset a following slack period.

"Right now a double-barreled shotgun is pointed at all our heads. One barrel symbolizes the enemy without and the other the enemy within," he told the Eugene chamber of commerce. "One is the threat to our security from foreign despots; the other is the threat to our solidarity from the idle hands and hungry mouths at home."

"Within a few months private contractors as well as the WPA will have almost completed their cantonment, airport and access road construction which makes up most of the defense activity in this state," he added.

WPA rolls now list 9218 workers in Oregon compared with 22,000 three years ago and 13,199 last year.

Youth Arrested On Desertion Charge

1942 Model Cars Cut 50 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—The war department Friday requested the office of production management to arrange for an immediate cut in automobile production—the second in less than two months.

The first request called on the industry to reduce output of 1942 models by 20 per cent. It was reported that tonight's request calls for an additional 30 per cent, or a total of 50 per cent.

rectly by Germany and Italy. One government official expressed belief, however, that other amounts might be held here for them under other names. Assets of other countries already frozen but not included in today's order have been estimated at \$4,500,000,000.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau, who will administer the new order and who had been urging a general freezing of foreign investments here, said recently that "the barn is empty now — the horse is gone," indicating that Germany and Italy had removed much of their assets.

"These measures," said a White House statement, "in effect bring all financial transactions in which German and Italian interests are involved under the control of the government, and impose heavy criminal penalties upon persons failing to comply therewith."

"The executive order is designed, among other things, to prevent the use of the financial facilities of the United States in ways harmful to national defense and other American interests, to prevent the liquidation in the United States of assets looted by duress or conquest, and to curb subversive activities in the United States."

arrived here Friday afternoon to move the body back into California.

Mrs. Harpham will again be asked to testify at a preliminary hearing before the justice of the peace in Alturas, and if the age of Ramona is found to be 13 years, she will be certified to the juvenile court.

Harpham was shot with a .45 revolver which, said his young son at the coroner's inquest Friday, was on a dresser in the children's bedroom. Harpham had left two bullets in the gun after he had used it in target practice on Tuesday afternoon.

Information gathered here by Klamath county authorities was forwarded to Deputy District Attorney Roger Burum of Alturas on Friday afternoon, according to District Attorney L. Orth Sisemore.

It is understood that Harpham served as timekeeper at Algoma Lumber company for several years about 1934 or 1935.

ray's proposal is "in effect, the mediation board's proposal," of returning to work while a federal study is made of the dispute.

Murray is a member of the national defense mediation board. Orton left a board meeting at Washington, defying the board's suggestion and characterized it as "labor-busting." Murray summoned him to Washington again this week and he was due home to report to union delegates at a meeting in Olympia tonight.

Richard Francis, regional CIO organizer, said he received a telegram today from Adolf Germer, special IWA organizer, also summoned to the capital. Orton would urge his men to accept Murray's proposal.

Southeast England Bombed by Nazis

LONDON, Saturday, June 14 (UP)—German raiders, directing their attacks mostly at south and southeast England, last night bombed several points on the coast and it was feared that several persons were killed.

A lone moonlight raider bombed a southeast coast town early this morning, demolishing a number of houses, and it was believed that several persons were trapped in the ruins.

It was authoritatively reported that at least five of the raiders were shot down during the night.

London had an alarm early this morning but only a few planes were heard and anti-aircraft fire was light. The city was quiet for more than an hour before the all clear was sounded.
